This week's Parsha

"May my discourse come down as the rain, My speech distill as the dew, Like showers on young growth, Like droplets on the grass ..." - Deut. 32:2

This weeks' Parsha is Haazinu (listen). The parsha begins with a dramatic poem or plea from Moses not to the people or God, but instead he calls upon the Heavens and the Earth to hear his plea. His poem starts with the 4 lines quoted above. As we move from the summer, the imagery of rain in the parsha is a powerful one. Just as the earth needs rain to sustain life, Moses' words (words of Torah) are needed for our sustenance.






