Family, Friend and Neighbor Appreciation Week is celebrated the week after National Grandparents Day to recognize the millions of grandparents, as well as the aunts, neighbors, community members and other FFN caregivers who support our communities and care for young children all over the country. FFN caregivers represent the largest percentage of the early childhood workforce and we want to take the time to recognize them.

FFN APPRECIATION WEEK FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS (FAQ)

Who is considered a family, friend and neighbor caregiver?

Family, Friend and Neighbor (FFN): A broad term encompassing many types of caregivers, typically those who have a previous relationship with the children for whom they care. Family, friend and neighbor care makes up the majority of home-based child care. They are the grandmothers, nanas, aunties, abuelitas, family, friends and neighbors who care for children. Most states allow FFN caregivers to be legally license exempt, or legally non-licensed, meaning they are not required to pursue licensure to serve the (usually smaller) number of children they care for. These caregivers may be paid or unpaid and may not view themselves as providers.

Why is it important to increase awareness around family, friend and neighbor caregivers?

Rebuilding a thriving economy will depend on strengthening home-based care, including FFN child care. Home-based child care providers make it possible for parents of young children to work and contribute to the economy. Family, friend and neighbor (FFN) providers, who include grandparents, aunts and neighbors are the mainstay of the American child care sector. Over 5 million FFN caregivers look after 11.5 million children including 5.8 million children ages 0-5 (NSECE, 2019).

One in four children in the U.S. under the age of 5 is cared for by a grandparent some or all of the time their parent is at work (ZERO TO THREE, 2017).

Why do families choose FFN care?

Parents choose FFN care as a first choice for a variety of reasons. FFN care is preferred by immigrant and Dual Language Learner (DLL) families: While many U.S. families rely on FFN care, it is particularly prevalent among immigrant and DLL families. FFN care is also more cost effective and allows for flexible scheduling options. FFN care is also more flexible and accessible for rural families, who are less likely to use child care centers than families living in urban and suburban areas.

How do children benefit from FFN care?

Young kids' brain development most needs nurturing relationships. The basic architecture of the brain is constructed through an ongoing process that begins before birth and continues into adulthood. Early experiences affect the quality of that architecture by establishing either a sturdy or a fragile foundation for all of the learning, health and behavior that follow. Home-based settings, inclusive of FFN care, is the ideal setting to develop, support, and nurture these relationships.
