Web building resources for your AdSense website

What kind of site are you planning on building? Is it simple or complex, large or small? What multimedia elements are you planning on incorporating? These are some of the questions you have to face when planning and organizing your site.

Depending on your budget, your expertise and the complexity of the site you are planning to build here are a few tools you might need to put it all together:

- A basic text editor (like notepad or TextEdit, if you are hand coding).
- A FTP client (to download your site to your webhosts servers).
- An image editor (you can get a free one like Photoscape or buy an industry standard like Adobe Photoshop).
- An HTML and/or What-You-See-Is-What-You-Get (WYSIWYG) editor. This is optional but getting one would make your life a lot easier.

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
