Kia ora parents, whānau and carers

Thank you to all the parents and whānau who attended the learning conversations. It was a great opportunity to share valuable information about each child and involve the children in their learning journeys. I recently had a hui with the MOE (Ministry of Education) about attendance. Why Does Regular Attendance Matter? You might be thinking, "Does missing a few days really matter that much?" The answer is yes. Research and our own experience tell us that when children attend school regularly, they are more likely to:

- Achieve academically: If they're in class, they're learning. If they miss a lot, or even key learning in a single lesson, they can fall behind. This affects their confidence and progress in all learning areas.
- Stay connected socially: School is also about friendships and routines. Kids who attend daily feel more connected. If they're often away, they may feel isolated or anxious and not want to come to school. It can then become a cycle that can be very hard to break.
- Build good habits: Regular attendance builds work habits and responsibility that help throughout life. It also builds resilience. As two of our school values, responsibility and resilience are very important to us.
- Access support: If a child is struggling, we can help sooner if they're at school. Absences make support harder, especially from services like RTLB.

Missing lots of school can lead to long-term challenges. Consistent attendance helps tamariki to feel they belong and helps them to avoid falling behind.

Lent finishes on Thursday 17 April and is followed by Good Friday on 18 April, and Easter Sunday and Monday on 20 & 21 April, with ANZAC Day, on 25 April, the second Friday in the school holidays this year. We finish this term on Friday at 2pm. Thanks for organising to pick your children up at this time.

Working consistently well in class, caring for others putting in lots of effort at maths and showing the Hay Park Way.



Cooking with Miss P - Term 1


