### **Course Description**

The main goals of this course are to develop the inquisitive abilities of every student so that they become capable scientific investigators. The curriculum provides for ample opportunities to acquire scientific knowledge by making connections with real-life experiences. The students will also engage in working like scientists do in the real world through several scientific practices: asking questions; creating and using models; analyzing and interpreting data; thinking; constructing explanations; and collaborating and communicating information. During the course of a year the students will explore different topics within the main branches of Science: Physical Science, Life Science, and Earth Science.
