

TITLE IN ALL-CAPS ARIAL 16PT BOLD

Subtitle (if Applicable) in Arial 14pt

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Abstract - All papers must include an abstract and a set of keywords. The Abstract and Keywords text must be 10 point Arial, fully justified and contained within one paragraph. Begin the Abstract with the word Abstract - in Arial italic. The entire Abstract should be in bold. Do not indent. Use a standard dash after the word "Abstract." Do not cite references or use abbreviations in the abstract. It should be approximately 225 - 250 words. (arial 10pt)

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Authors are suggested to present their articles in the section structure: **INTRODUCTION - THE MATERIALS AND METHOD - RESULTS AND DISCUSSION - CONCLUSION**. The discussion should provide a bridge between results and the literature review in introduction. Please be sure that the citations are up to date. All the citations should be listed in the references. It is expected that the citations are at least 30 references/sources, and 80% from the latest publication (2019-2022) from journal/proceeding indexing by Scopus (HIGHLY RECOMMENDED). JARE requires authors to submit at least 12 pages article, excluding the references.

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Title. The title should consist an informative title, the full names and affiliations of all authors, and email address of the corresponding author.

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Acknowledgment. Acknowledgment, if applicable, should consist of 50 words maximum.

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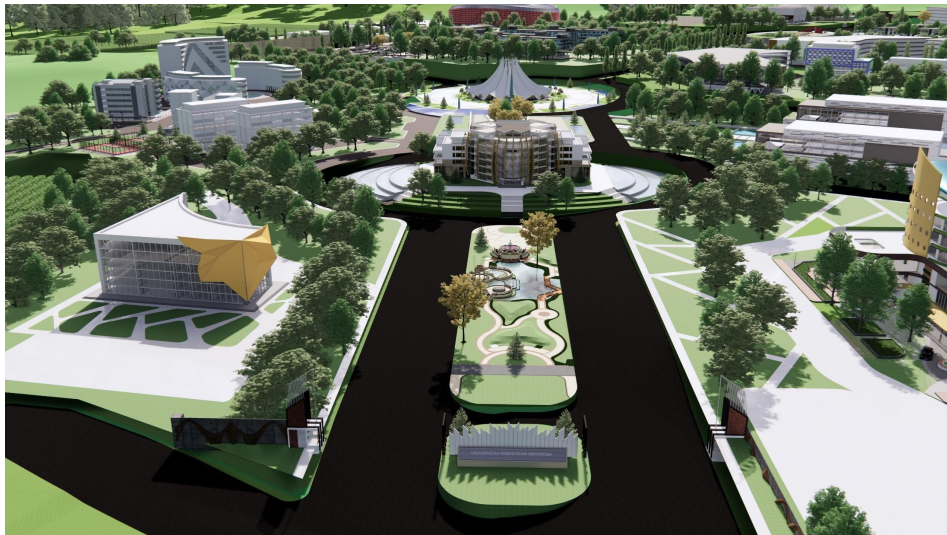

The texts should use the in-text citation format. For example, Becker (2001) wrote an article on prairie farmers. An article on energy proposes a solution in encountering energy crisis (Becker and Seligman, 1981).

Referred pages should be indicated whenever it is applicable (Becker, 2001, pp. 183-90). Multiple references should be written completely (Bergquist, 1992; Brislin, 1984).

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
