

ROWHOUSE MINNEAPOLIS COMPREHENSIVE AMENDMENT SURVEY

Property Context

The properties located at 709 - 715 2nd Ave SE are currently vacant. Under the Minneapolis 2040 Plan, this location is zoned for high-density development with a minimum building height requirement of 10 stories. The property owner is requesting a Comprehensive Plan Amendment to change the zoning to allow for a 3-story, mid-density urban rowhouse (townhouse) development instead. The current future land use designation does not permit an all-residential development. The proposed amendment is not only to reduce the minimum height, but also to allow an all-residential project. 701 LLC submits that this 62' x 100' parcel is far too small and narrow to physically and economically accommodate the current requirements for this underutilized property and offers to bring residential diversity to this high amenity location.
