- A new math course has been approved for school use beginning in Fall 2020 Technical Math for College and Career
 - Prerequisites are Algebra One and Geometry

AR Math QuEST

Follow-up support cycle 1 for AR Math QuEST Cohort One teachers will wrap up tomorrow. All 52 teachers have completed a planning, visit, and reflection cycle focused on effective teaching practices for goals and tasks and standards for math practices for students.



According to DESE, due to capacity "We will not begin Cohort 2 training until Summer 2021, after Cohort 1 has completed their 2-year program. The only additional teachers trained next year will be those who are trained and supported in their own district by IFs who have gone through the AR Math QuEST TOT and coach training."

• YEAR THREE NOVICES

- We are excited to offer Year 3 novices the opportunity to earn up to two microcredentials. Please know that
 this will be online and asynchronous (teachers work on their own schedule) and will only require teachers to
 be out of the building one HALF day to set up their account, learn how to work through the microcredential,
 what is expected, etc.
 - The first micro-credential began last month with 58 participating 2nd and 3rd year novices.
 - Another opportunity to earn a micro-credential will be provided to novices next semester.

• ADMINISTRATOR SUPPORT

- Special Plan for Administrators The first 30 administrators who complete the components below will have their registration cost paid for next summer's Culture Keeper's Institute:
 - Attend both days of Dr. Anthony Muhammad's Culture-Building Sessions (these are follow-up to, not a repeat of, last February's training):
 - Feb. 12th
 - Complete a microcredential or an action research project (with support from Dr. Morledge) that is focused on creating/improving culture in their building. We want it to be something they should be doing they simply keep some records on what was done and what the impact/outcome was. A third training for admin on the micros is being held today.
- CULTURE KEEPERS: Principal Leadership in a PLC at Work Institute June 10-12, 2020 This Institute is led by currently practicing principals and superintendents. Research has validated what practitioners have known for decades: powerful principal leadership is key to increased student achievement. Principals are responsible for both building and keeping a positive and productive school culture. Participants will connect with a professional community of leaders committed to best practices and continuous improvement. Hear inspiring keynotes from seasoned leaders who have faced challenges like the ones they are facing now, and get one-on-one help. Build a toolkit of strategies and ideas for creating a positive culture in their buildings. Be called to action by a series of 20-minute high-impact talks by principals who have successfully nurtured collaborative teams focused on student learning.

Behavior Support Speciality (BSS)

UPCOMING TRAININGS:

• Behavior Essentials: Necessary Skills to Effectively Change Behavior

The Behavior Essentials is a three session, eighteen hour professional development to help school staff understand and change behavior. Consecutive attendance in all three sessions of Behavior Essentials is required prior to attending any of the Targeted Intervention Trainings being offered throughout the school year. Additionally, the **Essentials are required in 2019-20 for the development of future school district BX3** teams that will receive in depth training and coaching toward building local capacity. The following descriptions differentiate what topics will be addressed per each session:

Session 1: Essential Behavior Concepts

Participants will be introduced to applied behavior analysis, an established scientific approach to meaningful behavior change. Behavioral concepts covered in this session will provide a -foundation and an understanding of behavior; common language and the process used to address challenging behavior will be promoted through the behavioral concepts. Participants will experience a theoretical shift relative to behavior management and behavior change.



Session 2: Essential Data Collection

Participants will define behavior in measurable and observable terms as a prerequisite for measuring behavior through data collection procedures. Participants will learn how to use the best data collection method to collect baseline data, determine function of behavior, design interventions and progress monitor.

- Session 3: Essential Behavior Strategies
 - Essential Behavior Strategies focus on interventions that are proactive and may prevent or avoid problem behavior, while increasing and reinforcing positive behavior. Participants will be able to describe and implement several strategies based on behavioral research, including individual and group interventions.
- We will provide Essential trainings twice within each month for each session in order to provide flexibility for
 participants. Please refer for <u>EscWorks</u> to register for the workshops.

SPED Transition

- Arkansas Transition Services staff will be trained in the Self-Determined Learning Model of Instruction to become
 Train the Trainers this December. We will then be providing training for teachers hopefully this spring across the state.

Division of Career & Technical Education (DCTE)

- CTE is now the Division of Career and Technical Education (DCTE) under the The Division of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE).
- Perkins V transition year has begun. Working with DESE and DCTE to meet expectations
- Business/Industry recognized certification are currently the ONLY indicator for skill attainment in DCTE programs.

Migrant

- The migrant education program is in partnership discussions with two HEP (High School Equivalency Programs) entities in order to bring this type of program to the service area. This would benefit parents and Out of School Youth in the Migrant program. It would also benefit the general public as well.
- NWAESC is beginning to service students with tutoring in Non-Project schools.



- Many district Migrant Education Programs are conducting Parent Involvement events/meetings and Parent Advisory Council meetings.
- NWAESC will hold a Parent Advisory Council meeting in the Spring.
- At the state level, the Arkansas Migrant Education Student Leadership Academy (AMESLA) was held in Little Rock on October 11-13. This event was attended by over 40 Migrant Education students from across the state. It was so successful that there is the potential for another event in the Spring.
- The NWAESC is in discussion with two local health service providers on establishing protocols and procedures for the Migrant Education students who may need health services. This work should be completed by the end of this month.
- The NWAESC is establishing relationships with George's, Tyson, and Simmons cooperation in order to be allowed in the new employee orientation process.
