Welcoming our Keynote Speaker: Dr. L. J. Randolph



L. J. Randolph Jr., Ed.D., is an assistant professor of World Language Education at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Dr. Randolph's teaching career has spanned 20 years, including a decade as a high-school Spanish and ESL/ESOL teacher for Chapel Hill-Carrboro City Schools. At the university level, he has taught undergraduate and graduate courses in Spanish language, contemporary Latina/o/x cultures, and second language teaching methods. He has also directed study abroad programs in China, Mexico, Spain, and the Dominican Republic for secondary, undergraduate, and graduate students.

Dr. Randolph's research, publications, and professional engagement have focused on a variety of critical issues in language education, including teaching Spanish to heritage and native speakers and incorporating justice-oriented and anti-colonial pedagogies. He has authored/co-authored several publications and given dozens of scholarly presentations on those topics. He is a co-editor of the forthcoming book How We Take Action: Social Justice in PreK-16 Classrooms.

Throughout Dr. Randolph's career, he has served in leadership roles in various language organizations, including president of the Foreign Language Association of North Carolina (FLANC), president of the North Carolina Chapter of the American Association of Teachers of Spanish and Portuguese (AATSP), coordinator of the Cape Fear Foreign Language Collaborative (CFFLC), board member for the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL), and founding vice-chair of ACTFL's special interest group for Critical and Social Justice approaches.

Dr. Randolph is a North Carolina native (born in Wilmington) and a proud graduate of North Carolina's public schools (East Columbus High School '97; University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill [BA '01, MAT '03, EdD '11]). As a longtime member and past president of FLANC, he looks forward to returning home to share, learn, and fellowship with his colleagues from North Carolina.





#5 To Google or not to Google, That is the Question: The Threat of On-line Translation to Foreign Language Education

Dr. Javier Alvarez-Jaimes (North Carolina Central University) & Dr. Sharrah Lane (UNC Chapel Hill)

Online translation has increased in popularity in the last decade as a simple solution for commercial translation needs. With the proliferation of tools like Google Translate and Deepl whose accuracy has improved over the years thanks to the arrival of artificial intelligence, the future of fields such as translation, interpretation and even language education seems to be doomed. However multiple studies show that translations produced via these tools, when compared with human source translation, are plagued with issues like misinterpretations and confusion. This presentation considers the feasibility of online machine translations in certain scenarios and whether the use of such tools benefits or become obstacles for the achievement of language acquisition goals in the classroom. The solution? A transformation of the teacher's perception for a thoughtful incorporation of such tools in the foreign language classroom.




