Course Description

The B level student is called an "independent user" of the language, which implies that they are capable of acting linguistically as a social agent in daily life transactions, in social interactions and with different types of texts with a sufficient level of autonomy to be able to carry out most tasks that involve the use of the language in a Spanish-speaking country.

Course Content

Unit 1: Volver a empezar

- Review of present, Pret. perfect and past indefinite.
- Ya/todavía no + perfect tense.
- Verbal periphrasis (ej. acabar de + infinitive)

Unit 2: Antes y ahora

- Past imperfect.
- Temporal markers for the description of the past (entonces, en aquella época)

Unit 3: Prohibido prohibir

- Expressions of prohibition (ej. está prohibido).
- Se impersonal. Verb "soler".
- Quantifiers (la mayoría, la mitad, etc)

Unit 4: Busque y compare

- Affirmative and negative imperative and uses of the imperative
- The position of the DO and IO pronouns.
- Contrast past perfect/present

Unit 5: Momentos especiales

- Past indefinite and past imperfect.
- Indefinite vs. Imperfect in estar + gerund. Temporal markers.

Unit 6: Mensajes

- Telephone language.
- Share messages from others.



• Communication strategies.

Unit 7: Mañana

- Future imperfect.
- Temporal markers to speak of the future. Resources to form hipótesis about the future (Seguramente...)
- First conditional (Si + presente, future)

Unit 8: Va y le dice (complementaria)

- Talk about movie genres, novels.
- Tell narrations in present tense (Va de...)
- Pronoun positions DO and IO and "se" instead of "le"

All classes follow the integration of skills, student involvement in tasks, group dynamics and pragmatic and socio-cultural value of the topics. The homework should be oriented towards the integration of the student in an immersion situation in addition to personal work.

Given the immersive nature of CLM teaching, during class instruction the level B student develops the strategies, linguistic and socio-cultural knowledge that allow him or her to deal with these transactions outside of class, while at the same time reflecting on these personal experiences during class instruction. In the CLM language courses, students carry out tasks inside and outside of class that allow them to develop the linguistic and socio-cultural strategies and knowledge that enable them to face the social interactions typical of an independent social agent.

Instruction, to the extent possible, is connected to the needs of students as it fosters the development and functional depth necessary for them to successfully navigate these social interactions. An example is level B students who are interested in participating in the academic community of Granada to take content subjects, in which case class instruction pays special attention to training in the educational skills necessary to function in the interactions of said area.

To have the right to be evaluated, attendance at 80% of the classes is mandatory.

Exit test (50% of the final grade)

- Written and oral test. Midterm exam (25%)
- Written and oral test. Final exam (25%)

Continuous evaluation (50% of the final grade)

- Active and productive participation in class + daily tasks (10%).
- Use of appropriate grammar in assigned written assignments written outside of class (20%)
- Use of appropriate structures and knowledge in individual weekly presentations (10%)
- Use of structures and knowledge consistent with the end of the level in the final project in front of the class the last week of the course (10%)
