Procedure:

Day 1 Preview/Choose 3 possible topics

For the first 5 minutes- Decide if you want to go solo or work with up to one other person in your SS class. Remember if you are working with another person, your grade will ALL BE THE SAME and dependent on the strength of your partner's work. Choose wisely as this will count as a <u>LARGE PROJECT GRADE</u>. EVERYONE MUST EQUALLY PARTICIPATE IN THE PROJECT.

For the next 10-15 minutes- Take out a piece of loose leaf paper. Put your group member(s) names on it and SS class period. Choose 3 topics that you are interested in researching. List the topics on your paper and turn in before the end of class.

Day 2

After topic approval (by the teachers)- fill out the Introduction to Topic Page using a source of your choice. <u>Each</u> person in the group will fill out this page using a different source. This will be homework if you do not finish it in class during the library time. **Get initialed by Peterson/Phillips.**

- Fill out the Research Checklist (and Timeline) with your name and topic.

Glue it to the envelope and hand it in. (This Checklist will be kept at school.)

REMINDER - Each student needs at least 2 RELIABLE sources, you may use more.

**Wikipedia is not a reliable website--you cannot always verify the credentials of the author of the article.

Days 3 - 5 RECORD YOUR RESEARCH

Day 3 - setup MyBib

Record your research on the Research Form.

Have completed form initialed by teacher or finish for homework and get initialed the next day.

REMINDERS FOR YOUR PROJECT

Your presentation should be between 5-7 minutes long. There will be a penalty if you do not meet the time requirement.

Each person should **EQUALLY** complete the finished project and present to the class. All group members will receive the <u>same grade</u> with the exception of your oral presentation/question/answer portion of the grade.

Develop a plan - divide up the work and exchange contact information so you can work together outside of class. This cannot be finished in class. Any group who does not keep up with daily assignments indicated for this project is subject to working alone (group broken down).

Any typed, or written materials must be large enough for the audience to see clearly.

Arrange in advance if you need special equipment (ex. Elmo). Be sure to practice with equipment BEFORE your presentation!

All work should be grammatically correct, including spelling.

ANY DEGREE OF PLAGIARISM WILL RESULT IN AN AUTOMATIC ZERO ON THIS PROJECT.

Outside of Class- PREPARE SCRIPT Using the Script Form

- 1. Write down what you will say to the class during your presentation.
 - a. This script will tell the class more information than what appears on your project.
 - •It must include at least 2 additional facts, points, or details for each slide.
- 2. Rehearse your script DO NOT read directly from your script when you present to the class.
