Pebbledashed rubble with slate roof. 2 storeys. Windows rebated and chamfered with mullions, some restored in concrete. To the left of the door are 2 of 2 lights. To the right are one of 3 lights and one formerly of 2 lights, with mullion removed. On the 1st floor are 2 of 3 lights, and a central window with plain reveals. The door has a rendered surround. Gable chimneys. Interior much altered: on the ground floor it has one chamfered main beam, a spice cupboard recess, and a plain stone fireplace of C19th type.</i> 1871 – Joshua Lamb aged 34, statesman and farmer of 36 acres. (born at Arkholme and died in Gressingham in 1929). Betsy Lamb aged 29, wife (born in Gressingham and died in 1875). Children were William Hodgson age 7 born Eskrigge, John age 5 born Cawood, Mary Jane age 4 born Cawood, James age 1 born Eskrigge. Mary Rawlinson, servant born in Clawthorpe and had left by 1881. John Drinkall , relative, born in Gressingham, farming 28 acres (1881 shows John Drinkall living at Low House – presume same person) 1881/1901 – Joshua Lamb, yeoman farmer 1901 – Richard Lamb, farmer Last entries are Eskrigg so presumed Eskrigg Hall as most other farms accounted for and Lamb appears later, possibly son. 1912/4 – James Lamb (yeo), farmer Mrs Ward farmed here until the late 1970's. Her sister Gwen was married to Henry Thackeray from Red Load Farm, Locka Lane, and they had a daughter Olive who now lives at Bolton-le-Sands. John and Adrienne Townley lived there for a few years and on selling the property kept the barn which they had converted across the road, namely Waterbrow Wood. The Davies family sold in 1997 to Peter and Deborah Robinson and family.
