Hiking, Camping, and Backpacking with Leigh Anne




This Intensive will be designed for those that want to be in the mountains and outdoors in May. For the first week we will be hiking and camping around Anchorage. During the second week, we will be going on a three to four day backpacking trip. Right now the destination for the first camping trip is Bird Ridge Campground. This campground is close to Anchorage and we can hike Bird Ridge from the campground. The backpacking trip is tentatively set for Caines Head Recreation area out of Seward. The trail follows the beach and has to be hiked in low tide, and the opportunity to view sea life along the way is fantastic. We will camp at a beach campground and hike to Fort McGilvray, a World War 2 fort set up to protect Seward from Japanese submarines. When we are not hiking, we will be playing epic games of capture the flag, hanging out around a campfire, and potentially doing a community service trail project. Students who do not have backpacking gear should still sign up because gear can be borrowed. The final trip locations will be determined by parent volunteers and snowpack, but here is a tentative schedule:

Movies and visual media is a mainstay of life are you ready to develop your critical thinking skills and visual literacy???!!! We will also be using different lenses to tackle some of the central questions films explore. EX: How historically accurate does historical fiction have to be? What does it indicate when characters are not developed equally? What are some pervasive stereotypes that are represented? Who do you identify with in film? Why?
