## **EMERGE125 and Tiffany Rea-Fisher: Spelling and Pronunciation Guide**

EMERGE125: Always stylized as one word, no spaces, in all caps. The company's name is pronounced "Emerge One-Two-Five." The name refers to the company's Harlem foundation, off of 125th Street. When repetition or necessities of space demand it, the shorthand of E125 is acceptable for usage after at least one usage of the full company name.

Tiffany Rea-Fisher: please carefully note the spelling of "Rea" and "Fisher" as well as the hyphen in "Rea-Fisher." Please note that Tiffany's last name is pronounced "RAY Fisher."

Through a body of expressive, athletic modern dance work, EMERGE125 explores social dynamics and personal identity, illuminates and challenges systemic inequities, and inspires reflection and connection. We believe that dance can serve as a uniting force across differences in age, race, class, and more. EMERGE125 has been led by celebrated choreographer Tiffany Rea-Fisher since 2016. Based in Harlem, EMERGE125 has a strong education program, tours nationwide, and shares virtual content globally. By performing in traditional, multidisciplinary and non-arts spaces, as well as engaging in cross-disciplinary collaborations, we reach beyond traditional dance audiences—we

attract audiences who like to be surprised, challenged, and in dialogue with art of all kinds. Our youth dance education programs—serving K-12 students as well as pre- and early-career professionals—cultivate these same values in the artists and audiences of the future.

EMERGE125 Artistic Director **Tiffany Rea-Fisher** is a National Dance Institute Artist-in-Residence, National Dance Project Awardee, and Toulmin Fellow, among others, and curates the Contemporary Dance series for Bryant Park Picnic Performances. Rea-Fisher is a resident choreographer with Classical Theatre of Harlem (CTH); most recently, she choreographed the critically-acclaimed *Memnon* (2024, 2025). Outside of CTH, Rea-Fisher's theatrical work includes The Public Theater's *Pericles* (The Cathedral of St. John the Divine, 2025), *Gun & Powder* (Paper Mill Playhouse, 2024), and *The Tempest* (The Delacorte, 2023). She is an 8-time AUDELCO Award nominee. In her role as a community leader, Rea-Fisher is currently Executive Director of the Adirondack Diversity Initiative as well as the co-organizer of the annual Juneteenth March. She has been honored with a Spirit of John Brown Freedom Award, a Creatives Rebuild New York award, and a citation from the City of New York for her cultural contributions.

Rea-Fisher also instructs at E125's Summer Workshop, a weeklong intensive program for dancers. Rea-Fisher has been a dance teacher at Steps on Broadway in New York City since 2016 and was formerly a teacher at Joffrey Ballet School (2012-15).

**Tiffany Rea-Fisher** is the Artistic Director of EMERGE125, a Harlem-based, Black female-led dance company. As a dance choreographer, educator, curator, and leader,

Rea-Fisher has been honored with a National Dance Institute Artist-in-Residence (2024), Toulmin Fellow (2022) and Toulmin Creator (2021), National Dance Project Awardee (2021), Artist-in-residence at The Flea (2021-2024), APAP Leadership Fellow (2016-2020), and is the former Director of Lake Placid School of Dance (2017-2023). She has curated the annual Contemporary Dance series at Bryant Park Picnic Performances since 2014, providing free access to art for thousands of audience members while providing performance opportunities for more than 200 New York-based dance companies; during her curatorial tenure, she has grown the average attendance from 150 to over 2,000 per performance. Rea-Fisher is a COHI member of the International Association of Blacks in Dance and Advisory Board member of Dance/NYC. Rea-Fisher is also on the curatorial panel for the 2026 Future Dance Festival at 92NY.

Rea-Fisher has been commissioned by Dance Theater of Harlem, Dallas Black Dance Theater, NYC Department of Transportation, Utah Repertory Theater, The National Gallery of Art in D.C., and more, while her choreography has been produced at the Joyce, the Apollo, New York City Center, Joe's Pub, Aaron Davis Hall, Bryant Park, Red Bull Stadium, Works & Process at the Guggenheim, the Children's Museum of Manhattan, Chelsea Factory, New York Live Arts, and more, and her work has been performed before the Duke and Duchess of Luxembourg. Rea-Fisher was the first dance curator for the New York interdisciplinary arts organization The Tank, where she now sits on their Board of Trustees. Rea-Fisher co-founded Inception to Exhibition (2009-2020), a non-profit that facilitated low-cost, high-quality space rentals to artists and distributed grants to 15 New York City dance companies. She has worked extensively with fashion designers to present their works, including for events and films with Louis Vuitton and Paola Hernández. She has also been an instructor at Steps on Broadway since 2016, and previously at Joffrey Ballet School (2012-15).

Rea-Fisher has become a go-to choreographer for major theater directors, including Carl Cofield (Best Director, N.A.A.C.P.) and Saheem Ali (New York Theatre Workshop, Public Theater). As a theatrical choreographer, Rea-Fisher has been a resident choreographer with the Classical Theatre of Harlem (CTH) since 2016.
