You must have credit for a four or five hour college or university course equivalent to ACC Japanese 1411 with a grade of A, B, C. High school, community/continuing education credit, conversation credit, and previous knowledge are not acceptable substitute for the required prerequisite. You must present proof of this credit to your instructor by the twelfth day of ACC classes or you will be withdrawn from this course and may risk losing any refund.

Course Objectives: The main objective of this course is to develop competencies that align with the general education goals of critical thinking, interpersonal skills, civic and cultural awareness, personal responsibility, and written, oral and visual communication, in the Japanese language, at an appropriate level. The ability to understand and communicate and comprehend Japanese will develop along with the knowledge of the vocabulary, grammatical structures of the language, and exploration of how culture shapes communication.

At the end of Japanese 1412, students should be able to do the following:

CRITICAL THINKING:

- discuss the differences of public speaking training in the Japanese and the US education systems and explain what historical and political backgrounds have resulted in such differences.
- identify Japanese “role language,” and discuss the benefits and possible issues of using those phrases in the society.
- explain how hierarchy and seniority in the Japanese society have affected the linguistic structures of the Japanese language.

- compare and contrast aspects of Japanese society such as the education system, public transportation, and healthcare system with their own, and discuss some advantages and disadvantages of each.
- critically analyze the social issues and cultural implications found in the readings of the latest Japanese trends.

TEAMWORK (Interpersonal Skills):

- converse with partners about topics related to them.
- help one another with areas of difficulty.
- brainstorm in groups to organize tasks.
- discuss perspectives on cultural differences with partners or groups.
- share resources related to common interests.

SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY (Civic and Cultural Awareness):

- discuss the importance of cultural identity in different Japanese-speaking regions.
- compare Japanese values related to daily life such as leisure activities, relationships, and eating habits to those in their own society.
- demonstrate awareness of current events in Japanese-speaking regions.
- discuss implications of changes in Japanese society and compare them to changes in their own society.
- identify Japanese holidays and celebrations.
- demonstrate skills on how to give and accept compliments.

PERSONAL RESPONSIBILITY:

- show time management skills by successfully completing tasks on time.
- acquire effective study habits for language learning.
- use a variety of resources outside of class to practice Japanese language.
- discuss aspects of Japanese language and culture of personal interest.
- state how learning Japanese will be useful to them and improve their lives.
- make appropriate decisions when interacting with Japanese speaking people.

COMMUNICATION (Written, Oral and Visual Communication):

- communicate effectively in common situations such as when shopping for clothes, ordering in restaurants, or buying groceries.
- talk about topics such as daily routine, leisure activities, relationships, in the present, the past, and the near future.
- recount stories in the past.
- make conditional statements and hypothesize.
- utilize visuals and context to predict when listening.
- utilize organizing techniques and logical sequencing when writing.

- mention implications and applications of information they have read or heard.

TEAMWORK (Interpersonal Skills):

- complete a variety of language-based activities working in pairs and small groups.
- demonstrate the ability to negotiate meaning to complete language-based activities.
- demonstrate the ability to work in groups to achieve a common goal.
- demonstrate the ability to consider different points of view and work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal.

SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY (Civic and Cultural Awareness):

- compare recycling and waste management in Japan and the U.S.
- compare and contrast different perspectives on cultural issues, customs, and traditions after reading or listening to passages in the Japanese language.

- mention some differences among the Japanese-speaking countries.

- recognize the meanings and the pronunciation of 174 Chinese characters.
- interpret and express ideas through written, oral and visual communication.

In this course you will learn new grammatical structures and vocabulary to talk about the workplace, the arts, and current events, but there will also be a cyclical review of grammatical structures from previous Japanese courses that are useful for everyday communication. Students' ability to understand and communicate in Japanese will be enhanced as a result of the constant practice of the targeted grammatical structures and the acquisition of new vocabulary. During class, the component of listening and speaking will be emphasized. Students are expected to come to class well prepared so that they can participate in the discussions. Students will be required to work in pairs and small groups. Active participation in the discussion groups is essential for the success of the class. The reading and writing component of the class will be mainly practiced at home. The SAM (Student Activities Manual) and reading/writing assignments will be helpful to continue developing these two skills.

[For online classes.] In this online format class, our primary objective is to learn to communicate in Japanese. We will study vocabulary words and grammar rules with this end in mind. We will practice developing reading, writing, speaking, and listening skills.

Schedule of Work

Chapters 2, 3, and part of 4 must be covered in Japanese 1412. All the grammar and vocabulary in the material specified above of ***Yookoso*** must be taught. Have students read and study the grammar carefully before coming to class. The methodology of ***Yookoso!*** as outlined in the *Instructor's Manual* should be adapted and used for any classroom presentations and activities. The listening and written exercises from the workbook must be completed as homework assignments.

Writing: Students must be able to write the 75 new *kanji* to be taught during the semester. Give students *kanji* handouts to supplement the workbook exercises. At least two compositions must be assigned during the semester. Students will choose one of the compositions and give a speech to the class.

The following schedule of work is for classes meeting twice weekly, thirty-one times per semester. Sometimes the spring semester has one more class period (thirty-two days), in which case there will be an extra day for review.

After allotting five days for testing, twenty-six days remain for instruction. You should spend approximately the number of days indicated below on each unit. The instructor may want to use some of the class-time to show a subtitled movie or an animated film.

Course Policies (Instructors may add additional policies)

Due to the emphasis on oral practice, attendance is mandatory and will be checked daily. Departmental policy allows instructors to drop students with more than **three** absences. Leaving class prior to class dismissal without the instructor's approval will be counted as an absence. Language classes are very interactive and you will be required to participate regularly in class and group activities. Failure to participate will result in a lower daily grade for participation.

In the event the college or campus closes due to unforeseen circumstances (for example, severe weather or other emergency), the student is responsible for communicating with their professor during the closure and completing any assignments or other activities designated by their professor as a result of class sessions being missed.

Withdrawals

drop a student should he or she feel it is necessary. Incompletes

If there is a documented extenuating circumstance after the last day to withdraw, then you may be eligible for an incomplete. The student must be in good standing and have a C or higher. The student must consult with the instructor and the final decision will be at the instructor's discretion.

1. Prior to the end of the semester in which the I is to be awarded, the student must meet with the instructor to determine the assignments and exams that must be completed prior to the deadline date. This meeting can occur virtually or in person. The instructor should complete the Report of Incomplete Grade form.
2. The faculty member will complete the form, including all requirements to complete the course and the due date, sign (by typing in name) and then email it to the student. The student will then complete his/her section, sign (by typing in name), and return the completed form to the faculty member to complete the agreement. A copy of the fully completed form can then be emailed by the faculty member to the student and the department chair for each grade of Incomplete that the faculty member submits at the end of the semester.
3. The student must complete all remaining work by the date specified on the form above. This date is determined by the instructor in collaboration with the student, but it may not be later than the final withdrawal deadline in the subsequent long semester.
4. Students will retain access to the course Blackboard page through the subsequent semester in order to submit work and complete the course. Students will be able to log on to Blackboard and have access to the course section materials, assignments, and grades from the course and semester in which the Incomplete was awarded.

5. When the student completes the required work by the Incomplete deadline, the instructor will submit an electronic Grade Change Form to change the student's performance grade from an "I" to the earned grade of A, B, C, D, or F.

If an Incomplete is not resolved by the deadline, the grade automatically converts to an "F."

Approval to carry an Incomplete for longer than the following semester or session deadline is not frequently granted.

Copyright violations

Generative Artificial Intelligence Policy

This policy outlines the rules and expectations for the use of Generative Artificial Intelligence (GAI) tools in this course. This course is designed to help students develop their language proficiency through personal effort, practice, and engagement with course materials. In order to preserve academic integrity and support authentic language acquisition, the use of GAI tools is not permitted for use in drafting, editing, translating, or completing any coursework unless specified otherwise by the instructor. All assessments—including written assignments, class exercises, quizzes, and exams—must be completed using your own original language skills. The use of GAI in these assessments constitutes academic dishonesty. Submissions will be evaluated for evidence of authentic language production, and suspicious patterns may be subject to further review. Instructors may check whether students using vocabulary and grammar beyond the level of the course understand their use.

Generative Artificial Intelligence refers to any software or application capable of producing human-like text, translations, or corrections based on prompts or inputs. This includes, but is not limited to:

- AI language models (e.g., ChatGPT, Claude, Bing Copilot, Gemini)
- Machine translation tools (e.g., Google Translate, DeepL, Reverso)
- Browser translation features (such as in Chrome, Safari, Firefox and others)
- AI writing assistants or rewording tools (e.g., Grammarly, QuillBot, Wordtune)

Students are expected to use their textbook, course notes and handouts, dictionaries, or other reference materials to complete assignments.

Violation of this policy is considered a breach of academic integrity and may result in the following consequences:

- A grade of zero on the affected assignment or assessment
- A formal academic misconduct report filed with the College or university
- Failure of the course and additional institutional disciplinary action

Repeat violations may result in more serious penalties as determined by institutional policy.

Exceptions to this policy may be made only with prior documented approval from the instructor. Exceptions may include approved accommodations through [Student Accessibility Services](#) or explicit instructor-approved use of GAI for specific tasks (e.g., comparing machine translation with human translation as part of a guided activity).

may be immediately dismissed from the day's activity and will be referred to the Dean of Student Services for disciplinary action.

In the event of disruption of normal classroom activities due to an emergency situation or an illness outbreak, the format for this course may be modified to enable completion of the course. In that event, students will be provided an addendum to the class syllabus that will supersede the original version.

Campus Carry

The Austin Community College District concealed handgun policy ensures compliance with Section 411.2031 of the Texas Government Code (also known as the Campus Carry Law), while maintaining ACC's commitment to provide a safe environment for its students, faculty, staff, and visitors. Beginning August 1, 2017, individuals who are licensed to carry (LTC) may do so on campus premises except in locations and at activities prohibited by state or federal law, or the college's concealed handgun policy.

Use of the Testing Center

For Fall, 2021, the Testing Centers will allow only limited in person testing and testing time will be limited to the standard class time, typically one and one-half hours. Specifically, only the following will be allowed in the Testing Centers:

- Student Accessibility Services (SAS) Testing: All approved SAS testing
- Assessments Tests: Institutionally approved assessment tests (e.g., TSIA or TABE)
- Placement Tests: Placement tests (e.g., ALEKS)
- Make-Up Exams (for students who missed the original test): Make-up testing is available for all lecture courses but will be limited to no more than 25% of students enrolled in each section for each of four tests
- Programs incorporating industry certification exams: Such programs (e.g., Microsoft, Adobe, etc.) may utilize the ACC Business Assessment Center for the industry certification exams (BACT) at HLC or RRC
