

Tony Voogd, SG, (GT): Pitch merits of a different school - Oregon

The McKenzie River National Recreation Trail offers some of the most breathtaking views in the nation, with a crashing waterfall obscuring the entrance to a carved out cavern in the cliffs emptying into a crystal clear basin, all to the backdrop of the giant Douglas firs towering over 100 feet above.

Once you get on campus, coach Buck Wild will be able to tell you about even more of the hidden gems of the city though I'm sure even by the end of your year in Oregon you'll still be finding experiences you can't believe you hadn't tried earlier. Coach Buck is one of the loyalist coaches I've met, Tony. He's never cut a scholarship player, and has remained the coach - the producer - of "duck jam" for nine seasons.
