The new family that recently joined the Dodgers is emerging as a new "guardian" for bullpen pitchers. The Dodgers signed triangular trades with the St. Louis Cardinals and Chicago White Sox ahead of the trade deadline on April 30 (Korea time) and accepted Michael Kopech (28), a reliever who played for the White Sox.

Kopech, who made his Major League debut with the White Sox in 2018, was a starting pitcher who pitched in 30 games and 129 $\frac{1}{3}$ innings with a 5-12 record with a 5.43 ERA, but this year he turned into a relief pitcher and pitched in 43 $\frac{2}{3}$ with the White Sox, recording 2-8 record with a 4.74 ERA. Kopech was often mentioned as a trade candidate because he has attractive fastballs with speeds of 100 miles per hour (161 kilometers per hour), and eventually changed his uniform to the Dodgers.

However, the trade is already showing signs of a big success. Kopek has pitched in three games since moving to the Dodgers, and he is still displaying extraordinary pitching with an ERA of 0.00 days. $\boxed{\text{EEAO}}$

Kopech took the mound for the first time since his trade transfer in an away game against the San Diego Padres on Saturday. He struck out three strikeouts in one perfect inning. He showed off his best condition with the maximum speed of 100.6 miles (162 kilometers). In an away game against the Oakland Athletics on Sunday, Kopech allowed no runs in one inning to strike out one, and took root as a member of the Dodgers' must-win group by recording his first hold since moving to the Dodgers.

Kopek took the mound again in a home game against the Philadelphia Phillies on Saturday. Taking the mound at the top of the seventh inning with the Dodgers leading 4-3, Kopek treated leadoff hitter Nick Casteyanos to a groundout to shortstop, and Bryson Statt also grounded out to shortstop, earning two outs in an instant. Kopek, who had a critical hit to Austin Haze, then hit a four-seam fastball 99 miles (159 kilometers) off Garrett Stubbs to end the inning without allowing a run. While striking out one, Kopek allowed one hit and no run during one inning.

In the end, the Dodgers won the game 5-3, and Kopech earned another hold. Shohei Ohtani, who hit his 34th homer of this season, also displayed impressive pitching, as well as Kopech's scoreless streak since his transfer to the Dodgers.

Tyler Glasnow, the Dodgers' starting pitcher, struck out nine during six innings, allowing five hits and three runs to secure its ninth win of the season. Glasnow is a player that the Dodgers acquired through a trade with the Tampa Bay Rays ahead of this season. The Dodgers, which gained huge benefits by acquiring Glasnow through a trade, are planning to continue another trade success story through Kopec.
