Step 1: Re-read the question and formatting/submission instructions to confirm that you read and interpreted both correctly.

Step 2: Review the answer key (found on the Canvas Assignment page).

Step 3: If, after reviewing the assignment instructions and key, you decide to submit a regrade request, the next step is to (A) describe the correct answer and (B) explain why your answer is (also) correct. Please note: The correct answer must be included in the regrade request for it to be considered.

Step 4: Check the tone and merit of your request, and revise the text as needed before submitting.

Tone: Is the tone of your request respectful? Is it kind to the hard-working human being who will read it? As is commonly said: honey catches more flies than vinegar. The language and tone must be professional and appropriate for a learning environment--not rude or demanding--for the request to be granted.

Merit: Regrade requests are most successful when facts, evidence, and logic are used, rather than subjective opinion and wishful thinking.
