Course Description

In LTW I, students grasped the fundamentals of building a persuasive essay. By applying the three core principles of classical rhetoric, Invention, Arrangement, and Elocution, they worked toward mastering the development of a clear, well-structured argument from scratch to a polished final piece. The emphasis of LTW I was less on the specific style of persuasion and more on using the tools of rhetoric to construct solid, logical, and winsome writing.

In LTW II, the journey advances by developing the judicial address, a more sophisticated form that enhances and sharpens the persuasive skills introduced in LTW I. Just as the components of the initial level layered progressively, this second level extends and expands on that foundation.

Across seven essays, which focus on judging the specific action of a character, students operate within the same three rhetorical canons, but now tailored to a narrower approach.

Many elements will feel recognizable, like the invention charts, arrangement outlines, and elocution elements. However, this year students will be pivoting from pondering ‘should’ questions to judging the actions of a character and whether or not they deserve punishment. For example, students will look at questions such as whether Odysseus be punished for blinding Polyphemus, or whether George Wickham be censured for eloping with Lydia Bennett, for example. Not only will students build upon the Five Common Topics by adding Special Topics relevant to a Judicial Address (An Sit, Quid Sit, Quale Sit), they will ponder the meaning of justice as well as evaluate biases. They will pick a judge to address, craft arguments for both the prosecution and defence, and by considering the same issue from these two perspectives will lead them to discover flaws in their arguments.

In this joint literature and writing class, students will explore J.R.R. Tolkien's *Lord of the Rings* through the lens of decision-making: who makes choices, why, and what consequences follow. Over 30 weeks, students will write seven judicial addresses, drawing directly from the literature to practice crafting compelling arguments with clarity and eloquence. Each address cycle spans approximately three-five weeks, with weekly activities to ensure steady progress. This is not a class where you can master the material or complete assignments in one sitting the night before they're due—you must spend quality time with the texts, LTW templates, and exercises, carefully analyzing characters' decisions and rhetorical structures.

Each address cycle the student will ask a new question about the literature and learn a new element of Invention, Arrangement, and Elocution. There are no midterms or finals, as the work is cumulative, building steadily across the year. This course is designed for students eager to wrestle with ideas, sharpen their logic, and express their thoughts winsomely through the lens of literature.

Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

1. Learn three canons of rhetoric (Invention, Arrangement, Elocution) to craft compelling judicial addresses.
2. Develop critical thinking by analyzing actions and consequences in literature.
3. Write seven judicial addresses with clarity, structure, and persuasive appeal, drawing issues directly from the literature.
4. Apply rhetorical skills to other essay formats (e.g., expository, comparison) and thoughtful communication.
5. Engage in Socratic discussions about justice to explore decision-making themes: who makes choices, why, and what consequences follow.
6. Build a foundation for advanced writing, literary analysis, and classical education.

Course Materials

Submitting Work

- Invention and arrangement templates (handwritten) need to be brought to class on the due date every week for review.

- Final outline and essay must be typed (12 pt, Times New Roman, Arial, or Courier) and submitted together and uploaded into Google Classroom.
 - Your name, date, and address # need to be in the header.
 - Additionally, you will need to identify every element of Arrangement and Elocution within your paper either by a parenthetical citation or a footnote.

Grading

I don't provide letter grades. However, I will provide feedback on every address. Your address won't be considered complete until you've included all the necessary elements expected for that assignment. All Invention, Arrangement, and Elocution elements carry forward, so what you learn in address two you need to still demonstrate in address three and all the rest through address nine, etc. I will send your address back for revisions if there are missing elements, egregious grammatical/spelling errors, or a lack of coherent flow through the address.
