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MALIBU LINK OF ROOSEVELT







Completion of the new Malibu link of the Roosevelt Highway, tending forty-eight miles up the coast from Santa Monica to Oxnard will be observed with ceremonies Saturday when motorcades from San Monica and Oxnard meet at Little Sympson Canyon.





The program planned for the celebration will be announced within the next few days, but preliminary details worked out to date reveal that Gov. Young will be the principal speaker. The list of notables, headed by the Governor, will be augmented by other persons of prominence, including civic officials of Los Angeles, Oxnard, Ventura, Santa Monica, and officials of the State Highway Department.

Saturday morning motor caravan comprising hundreds of cars and highway banners will leave simul-

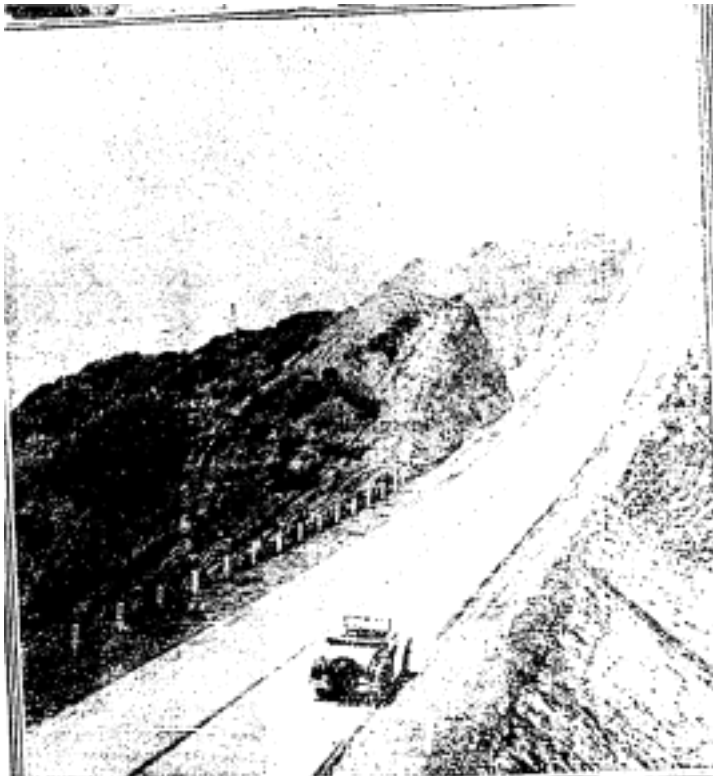
taneously from Santa Monica, Oxnard. They will meet at Little Sycamore Canyon, approximately halfway between the two cities and at noon join in celebrating the opening of the Malibu link to public travel.

The background of this new link of highway along the ocean's edge includes many highlights of more than ordinary interest. Historically the Malibu is rich in the lore of old Spanish days. The actual building of the road, too, embraces

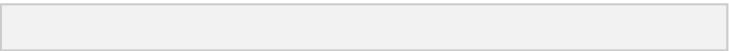
