## Soil

You want good well draining soil!

A.Percolation test. 1x1 hole, fill with water. If it drains in 1 to 3 hours=Awesome! Over 6 hours= Awful!

B.Quart jar test for general soil information

C.Soils lab test. Best!





## Seed

- A. Fresh good quality is best= good germination
- B. Planting depth 2x seed diameter, tamp soil/seed
- C. Keep continually moist till germination
- D. Know your planting to harvest dates
- E. For seed longevity store in airtight container in a cool, low humidity area. Fridge, basement, freezer.

## **Fertilizers**

- 1. Granular with high phosphate tilled in or
- 2. Foliar
  - A. I like foliar
  - B. Every 1-2 weeks application
  - C. It makes me look at garden often so as to notice weed and pest problems

## Sun and Water

- A. Try for at least 6+ hours of sun
- B. Afternoon shade can be good in hot summer
- C. Keep soil moist, not continual state of saturation

# When and What to plant Group A: Hardy Feb 15

(Plant as soon as the soil dries out in the spring). **Seed**: Kohlrabi, Onions, Peas, Radish, Spinach, Turnip

Plants: Artichoke, Asparagus, Broccoli, Cabbage, Turnip, Brussels Sprouts

### **Group B: Semi - Hardy March 1**

(Plants a week or two after 'A' group or about 2 weeks before average last spring frost).

Seed: Beet, Lettuce, Potato, Carrot, Parsley, Salsify, Endive, Parsnip, Swiss

Chard

Plant: Cauliflower

Apr. 11 - Apr. 20

## **Group C: Tender March 15**

(Plant on the average date of the last spring frost-about when first apples reach full bloom).

Seed: Cucumber, New Zealand Spinach, Spinach, Sweet Corn, Dry Bean, Snap

Bean, Summer Squash

Plant: Celery

### **Group D: Very Tender April 1**

(Plant when the soil is warm, about 2 weeks after 'C' group).

Seed: Cantalope, Lima Bean, Winter Squash

Plants: Eggplant, Pepper, Pumpkin, Tomato, Watermelon
