On Thursdays from 5:00-7:00 p.m. at the Provo Deseret Industries building located at 1415 N. State Street in Provo, law students and attorneys are available to give advice and possible representation on immigration issues and other issues commonly faced by our immigrant population. Walk-ins are welcome, but it is best to make an appointment by calling the Utah State Bar's Access to Justice hotline at **801-297-7049**. If there is no answer, you will hear a lengthy message. Wait until the end of the message to leave your name and phone number and tell them you need an appointment with the Community Legal Clinic in Provo.
