I curated this list with several things in mind: variety of stories, variety of genres, and variety of reading purposes. Some of you just want fun things to read over the summer, and some of you want good reading that will also challenge you. I've tried to include a good mix of both, while also including a variety of genres. I've even included my two favorite plays from Shakespeare, which are their own categories because...Shakespeare.

Books that are considered classics or often show up on AP Lit summer reading lists are marked with an asterisk. These books may likely challenge you beyond a fun summer read; however, don't let that discourage you. They are also examples of rich storytelling, and summer is a great time to stretch your reading skills without the pressure of grades or expectations.

During summer reading, I would encourage you to give the book at least 50 pages. If it doesn't have your attention within the first 50 pages, maybe try another book. The joy of summer reading is that you get to explore the kind of writing and stories that appeal to YOU. Don't force yourself to read something that is abhorrent to you, unless you're stubborn, which, in that case, all the best to you in your misery. :)

I would love to have included a synopsis for each book, but there are a lot of books on this list. Do some initial browsing here, and then google a synopsis for the book. Remember, your local library is an amazing place to get these books. Our school also has SORA available for FREE, so you can get your books on your phone, much like Kindle. Check out our school library website to access SORA. As satisfying as it is to buy my own books, it is equally dissatisfying spending money on a book and then being deeply disappointed by it.
