



The editors of *Interdisciplinary Humanities* are considering a change to our style manual requirements...

The Chicago Manual of Style has been the required manual for the journal. Our editors have proposed that we accept any widely accepted style manual.

Being interdisciplinary, we draw from diverse scholars whose may routinely use a different style. In particular, many default to MLA style, converting to the Chicago manual imposes additional labor on the author or on our editors, with little added value.

It is hoped the change will increase the number and quality of submissions.
