The men of Israel were defeated there by the servants of David, and the slaughter there was great on that day, twenty thousand men.

The battle spread over the face of all the country; and the forest claimed more victims that day than the sword.

and thrust them into the heart of Absalom,
while he was still alive in the oak.

Joab's armour-bearers, surrounded Absalom and struck him, and killed him.

16 Then Joab sounded the trumpet, and the troops came back from pursuing Israel, for Joab restrained the troops.

¹⁷They took Absalom, threw him into a great pit in the forest, and raised over him a very great heap of stones.

Then Ahimaaz ran by the way of the Plain, and outran the Cushite.

A week after Emancipation Day, I don't overlook the Cushite African soldier Ahimaaz son of Zadok better mentored by Joab (dare I reference "Hillbilly Elegy" of J.D.Vance?)

Reading the Epistle this Week

The seriatim read-through of Ephesians Leans into 'paraenetic' or moralistic advice About behaviours, attitudes, disposition

This stuff delights the therapeutic liberal reader, appearing to advocate eirenic mindfulness and to exclude the possibility of righteous anger

I indulge myself by adding 5:3-5 to the lection –
As popular in evangelical circles as the rest is in ours –
The exclusion of the 'other', taboo, shunned
