Accomplishments this Year

- Launched USG First ever Quarterly Reports to increase transparency on campus.
 -  USG Winter Quarter Report
 -  USG Autumn Quarter Report 2024
- Greek Life Representation: USG introduced Greek Life Liaisons, appointing Amelia Gibbs ('25) and Isaías Vilato ('26). This new role strengthens communication and collaboration between USG and Greek organizations, marking a milestone in inclusivity efforts.



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- Expanded Membership: Welcomed approximately 45 new committee members, selected from 68 applicants, increasing active participation within USG to around 75 members.
- African Language Expansion Program: Successfully introduced the first virtual Igbo language course at the University of Chicago in collaboration with the Chicago Language Center and Division of Humanities.
- Startup Spotlights – Launching Quarterly Startup Spotlights on Instagram to showcase the amazing ventures created by UChicago students
- Laundry Assistance Program: Launched a subsidized laundry card initiative to alleviate financial burdens for students, continuing a project initiated by former VP Campus Life Nina Hafner ('24).
- Transportation Feedback and VIA Rideshare Program: Worked closely with Transportation Services to collect student feedback and improve the VIA rideshare program.
- Advocated for the Expansion of 24-hour study Spaces on Campus, leading to additional capacity for late-night study spaces during finals week with Mansueto.
- Promoted documentation for students to fill out if they experienced housing insecurity to waive fees associated with winter break housing and continued to work on that expansion.

1. Countine our open “Office Hours” at specific times each week where students can drop in to discuss concerns or ideas with USG members.
2. Schedule events with RSO leaders to discuss best practices regarding the USG funding process.
3. Hold standing Zoom office hours to accommodate remote or off-campus students and provide accessibility to a wider audience.
4. Allocate a dedicated time slot during each cabinet meeting for a brief presentation from USG representatives, outside of the cabinet, to share updates and gather input
5. Establish a USG Committee on Greek Life

1. Collaborate closely with The Maroon to ensure accurate and timely reporting on USG activities and provide quarterly updates on internal programs and initiatives.



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2. Create a routine release of resolutions passed in College Council posted on Instagram
 - a. Regular updates on the goings-on of the College Council on Instagram
 - b. Quarter-in-review posts detailing what Student Government has achieved each quarter

RSOs

3. Conduct regular surveys or feedback sessions with CAT RSOs to identify funding needs and priorities and actively seek ways to address them.
 - a. Create a guidebook to help inform the RSO on campus to obtain sponsorship from other departments on campus
4. Establish joint committees or task forces with College Council and Cabinet members to develop and implement shared legislative policies pertinent to RSO needs/wants.
5. Increased focus on RSO leader training, such as how to fundraise, request funds, and organize events
6. Organize roundtable discussions or focus groups with race/ethnic/cultural affiliate RSOs to explore potential collaborations, events, and ways to support diverse student communities.
7. Increased collaboration with campus startups that aim to connect the UChicago community
 - a. Continue our Start-up Spotlight on Instagram

Current Initiatives

1. Finalize the establishment of the [Student Activities Fund](#) and implement a clear application process to support low-income students financially.
2. Increase USG outreach among campus partners on the South Side through connections with Local Officials.
 - a. Continued advocacy for the [Black House Campaign](#)
3. [Continuing narratives](#) with Divvy/Lyft, to pursue
 - a. A continued increase of Divvy stations on and around campus (resolution)
 - b. A general student discount, rather than one only for students on financial aid
4. Pursuing improvements to places of learning on campus
 - a. Pushing for improved Wi-Fi connectivity in areas with high concentrations of students, such as in libraries or in large classrooms (such as those in Kent, Saieh, or the Social Science Research Building)
 - b. [Expanding library access hours](#)
5. Pushing for the implementation of an [improved RSO events calendar](#) to improve RSO outreach to the student body
6. Continual regular meetings with [Advising Office](#) prior and after Pre-registration to express student feedback and monitor current initiatives



Future Initiatives

7. Collaborate with race/ethnic/cultural affiliate RSOs to create inclusive events and initiatives that celebrate diversity and promote cross-cultural understanding.
8. Continue advocacy efforts to [diversify the Humanities core curriculum](#) and ensure the representation of marginalized voices and perspectives.
9. Adding course feedback options for withdrawn students to create a more holistic picture of a course for potential students
10. Work closely with relevant departments and stakeholders to advocate for increased diversity within language departments, including hiring practices and course offerings.
11. Implement measures to address Reading Period violations, such as increased monitoring and enforcement of academic policies and providing resources for student support during high-stress periods.
12. Continue discussions with university administration and relevant departments to advance initiatives aimed at diversifying faculty and course offerings within language departments,
13. Develop a comprehensive training program for USG chairs and representatives, covering topics such as effective communication, conflict resolution, and project management skills.
14. Work directly with the Provost Office and Housing and Residence Life to provide financial aid support for students who stay during Winter Housing
