(10<sup>th</sup> Graders Entering 11<sup>th</sup> Grade)

**Graduation Requirements (minimum of 26 credits needed to graduate):**

English.....4 ½ credits credits	Physical Education.....1 ½

**Selecting Classes:**

Each student is required to take a minimum of seven (7) classes out of eight (8) periods per semester. The eighth class can either be another class or a study hall. The first classes selected should be any classes that were required during the 1<sup>st</sup> semester of the 10<sup>th</sup> grade year and were failed. The next classes selected should be the required classes for 11<sup>th</sup> grade. The final classes selected should be elective classes. Please note that study hall is considered an elective. If a student has enough credits to be on track to graduate on time, a study hall can be considered for each semester. If a student is behind in credits, one semester or both semesters of study hall can be taken out in order to add an additional class. This would be done to try to get the student back on track to graduating on time.

**Required Classes for 11<sup>th</sup> Graders:**

- English 11 (116/117) or CP English 11 (130/131)
- Consumer Education/Practical Math (783) (1 semester)
- Geometry (240/241) / CP Algebra II (248/249)/  
Algebra 3 (273)/Trigonometry (270) or Algebra 3 (273) / Statistics (272)
- Physiology & Anatomy (450/451) / Physics (440/441) / Environmental Science (430/431) /  
CP Chemistry (425/426) / Zoology (427) / Astronomy (428) / Botany (429)
- U.S. History (320/321) or AP U.S. History (328/329)

**Elective Classes:**

These classes add to your total credits for graduation, but are not considered required classes. When selecting your elective courses, pay attention to the grade level requirements and the pre-requisite requirements. Pre-requisites are classes that must be taken prior to taking that specific class.

**Alternate Classes:**

When selecting your elective classes, keep in mind that sometimes there are scheduling conflicts and not all of your choices may fit into a schedule. To ensure that you have at least 7 classes per semester, please choose other alternatives for the schedulers to work with. Each student should choose 3-4 alternate classes each semester and should list them in the order of priority. When choosing alternate choices for electives, choose what YOU want, not what your friends want and choose the classes that seem interesting to you. In other words, if you are not interested in taking a shop class, don't put it down as an alternative choice!

**Schedule Changes:**

Students will have an opportunity each semester to request a change in the classes requested previously. For 1<sup>st</sup> semester classes, students will have the first 4 days of the semester to request a change. For 2<sup>nd</sup> semester classes, students will have until the start of 2<sup>nd</sup> semester to request a change. After the designated time has passed, students will be "locked in" to their schedule of classes for that semester. The only exception to this rule is if a teacher finds that the student has been "misplaced" and requests for the student to be moved to a different course/level. **Please note, if a student does not enter course requests by the deadline, schedule changes will not be granted and the guidance department will create a schedule for the student.**

It is important to know that schedule changes do not always work out for a student. This can happen because the change doesn't fit into a student's schedule or class sizes are too big. Choose your classes wisely so that you get what you really want and not something that you might want.

**College Admissions Requirements:**

When determining admissions into a college or university, a student's GPA, ACT/SAT score, and high school courses are all taken into consideration. Each college and university will have their own requirements. Students should do their own research to find out the specific requirements for the schools they are interested in attending.

*Requirements for Most 4 Year Colleges and Universities*

- English.....4 Years
- Math.....3+ Years (Algebra I, Geometry, Algebra II)
- Science.....3+ Years
- Social Science.....3+ Years
- Foreign Language.....2 Years of the same language is suggested
