Journalist, Documentarian

John Biewen directs the audio program at the Center for Documentary Studies (CDS) at Duke University, where he produces the Center's Peabody-nominated documentary podcast, Scene on Radio. <http://www.sceneonradio.org>

Over several decades as an audio journalist and documentary maker, John Biewen has reported from across the United States, Europe, Japan and India. Before joining CDS, Biewen reported for Minnesota Public Radio, NPR News and American RadioWorks. His work has aired on programs such as All Things Considered, This American Life, Studio 360 and the BBC World Service.

Biewen grew up in Minnesota and now lives in Durham, North Carolina. He is co-editor of the book Reality Radio: Telling True Stories in Sound.

Professor Kendi is the author of [The Black Campus Movement](#), which won the W.E.B. Du Bois Book Prize, and [Stamped from the Beginning: The Definitive History of Racist Ideas in America](#), which won the National Book Award for Nonfiction in 2016. Professor Kendi also has produced five #1 New York Times bestsellers, including [How to Be an Antiracist](#) and [Four Hundred Souls: A Community History of African America, 1619-2019](#), co-edited with Keisha Blain.
