## Simple Blog Post Template for Guides & Tips

Answer these questions in the white space. Then use the prompt below!

1. **Start with the Problem.** What's one specific issue your readers face? Why should they care about this topic?

Ex: Say you're a landscaper. Your readers' issue might be that they plant a beautiful flower bed and 6 months later it's full of weeds and sad-looking, leggy flowers.

2. **Share Your Best Tip First.** Give them a clear, easy-to-follow tip. Keep it practical and actionable.

3. <b>Add 2-3 Supporting Tips.</b> What else can help your readers? Keep your tips short and to the point.
<ol> <li>Clear Up Any Misconceptions. Is there something people usually get wrong about this topic? Offer a quick explanation to set things straight.</li> </ol>
5. <b>End with a Simple Call to Action.</b> What should readers do next? Contact you, try out your tips,read this other post, etc.)

6. Now that you have an outline, start writing! Don't know where to begin? Put your notes from the above questions into an Al tool, like ChatGPT along with a detailed prompt like this:

"I've gathered information for a blog post about [insert your topic here]. I want to turn it into [an engaging and helpful] blog post for my readers while also making it SEO-friendly. Here's what I'm working with:

- Main topic: [Insert the core topic]
- Target audience: [Who is this post for? Describe the audience]
- **Tone of voice**: [Should it be fun, conversational, professional, educational?]
- **Primary goal**: [What is the blog post's main purpose? Ex. 'show people how to do something' 'offer tips,' 'share favorite tools I use as an expert.']
- Make sure to copy and paste your answers to the above questions.

The structure should flow like [a casual conversation] with the reader.

For SEO purposes, here are the important keywords to include naturally:

• [Insert your primary keyword plus 3-5 related keywords] Weave these into the content without making them sound forced or awkward.

Now don't just leave the Al-generated content. Use it as a first draft.

Zhush it up! Delete the unnecessary or doesn't-sound-like-you stuff. Infuse your voice. Add important details or a relevant story or analogy. Look at you go, you little writer, you!

## Actionable Tips

**Write like you're talking to a friend**: Imagine explaining the topic to a single reader. Using everyday words instead of industry jargon keeps it warm, direct, and personal.

**Be human:** Don't be afraid to sound like yourself—whether that's funny, empathetic, or casual.

**Examples and stories are powerful tools** to make writing more relatable, but if you use 'em:

**Make the story relevant:** The example or story should directly support the point you're making. It should help clarify your tip, not distract from it.

**No rambling:** Share just enough vivid detail to make the point clear and memorable. If you don't need it, cut it.
