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London Borough of Sutton, the country: Inside The Story

London Borough of Sutton, a place in the country (lat 51.36, long -0.18) that most outsiders could not point to on a map without first sighing, has become this week the latest entry in the slow-moving register of small communities behaving strangely under pressure. It is, in its way, the perfect microcosm of how communities of this size operate everywhere in the world, although the residents of London Borough of Sutton would object strongly to being called a microcosm of anything.

The roundabout, where one exists, remains the roundabout. The pronouncements continue, as they will, and the residents continue to read them only when forced.
