Peaceful Rest" "The Hageman's are buried near the entrance and there is one large modern monument as well as some older ones. Louis Hageman, father of Ward Hageman, well known Blue Islander, was buried in 1929."

Mention in "Pioneers In Peaceful Rest" "On one of the older monuments the inscription shows that Caroline Hageman, wife of John Hageman died in 1867 at the age of 52." {Caroline was the mother of Louis and Charles Hageman}.

Several members of the Cool family were buried here. They later removed to Mt Greenwood Cemetery & were interred there on September 9, 1887 (section 23, Lot 328). These include:

Benjamin Cool and his wife Jane, both born in New York State, came to Bremen Township in the 1840s and settled on a farm where the Midlothian Country Club now stands. In the 1850s Cool built a stone house at 148th and Cicero whose outside walls were two feet thick. this house was owned by members of the Cool family until 1918, and it remained standing until 1972, when it was destroyed by fire. This house served as the area's first courthouse. The farm stretched along Cicero from 147th Street to 159th Street.

Blue Island Sun-Standard - February 21, 1929

Louis Hageman, 81 years old, and one of the oldest settlers in Blue Island vicinity died at his home, 149th and Crawford, Midlothian, Thursday, after a long illness. He was born in Germany, Jan. 25, 1848, and came to the United States with his parents when he was nine years old, settling near Blue Island. In 1872 he married Alberta Hulett and three children are surviving him: Mrs. William Schwartz of Chicago, and Mrs. Olive Anderson and Ward Hageman of Midlothian. The funeral was held at the home Monday with Rev. B. F. Freese officiating and interment made in the Bachelors Grove cemetery.
