Welcome to your Senior Year at WCHS!

It's here! You're finally a senior! The end is in sight! Your year as a senior will be one of *endings* and *beginnings*. Several things will come to an end: your daily school routine, your involvement in clubs, sports teams, and performing groups, and your high school academic journey. At the same time, your life after high school is just beginning! You'll have new schools and new jobs. Some will move away to new homes. You'll make new friends and be involved in new groups. As an adult, you'll have new privileges and new responsibilities within your community. Life will never be the same again.

A huge part of our role in the Guidance Office at WCHS is to help you *end well* as you wrap up your time among us at WCHS, and *begin well* as you transition into your life beyond high school. These 2022-23 Senior Newsletters will help us communicate some important information to you as you make this transition.

What Comes Next?

A lot of you have already been considering what you'll do after high school. You're looking into potential jobs, careers, and further education. This month's newsletter will focus in seeking further education, as several deadlines are approaching quickly and have to be addressed to transition successfully into college.

Here are some steps to help guide you through the process of seeking further education:

Step 1: Ask: "What do I want?"

- a. **Curriculum** – What do I want to study? What will my major be? Which colleges, universities, or technical schools are the best at what I want to study?
- b. **Style of Education** – How much contact do I want with my professors? Do I prefer online and virtual learning, or is being on-campus more important?
- c. **Size** – Am I interested in attending a large or small school?
- d. **Admission Requirements** - What does the school require for admission? Can I meet those requirements?
- e. **Facilities and Services** – What would I like to see on or near my school's campus?
- f. **Campus Life** – How is life outside the classroom? What organizations, clubs, community organizations, etc. are available?
- g. **Campus Security** – What steps has the campus taken to provide a safe and secure environment, day and night? What is the community like?
- h. **Athletics** – Does the school offer intramural and varsity sports?
- i. **Housing and Resources** – Availability and quality of dorm life, public transportation if needed, food services, etc.? Am I able to commute from home if I wish?
- j. **Cost** – How much can I (and/or my family) afford? How much financial aid is offered by the school?

Step 2: Make a list (or two... or five...) to help you decide which school(s) to investigate.

- a. Compare the pros and cons of each school on your list.
- b. Group school choices by your chance of being admitted.
- c. Make your final list.

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- d. Get organized and be systematic in your approach – be sure to follow guidelines and meet deadlines. Turn applications into the guidance office early to allow time for processing.
- e. Seek the advice of people you trust to help make these decisions. ***Do NOT*** try to make it alone! You don't have to.

Step 3: Visit Schools – It is important to visit campuses, either in person if available or virtually if in-person visits are not available. It is very important to get a feel for the campus and see if the environment is a ‘fit’ for you, before committing. Get the most out of an in-person or virtual college visit by doing the following:

- a. **Prepare** for the visit – decide ahead of time what you want to learn about the school and put together a list of questions.
- b. Visit while classes are **in session!**
- c. **Schedule** your visit at least one week in advance. Call the admissions office or explore the admissions website to arrange your visit and inquire about campus tours
- d. Schedule interviews or appointments with an **admissions counselor**, and try to arrange to meet with professors or faculty who teach in your area of interest.
- e. Meet with a **financial aid officer**. Ask about scholarship and financial aid packages. Ask about the ‘real’ cost of attending their school, including housing, fees, meal plans, etc.
- f. **Tour** the campus. If the school offers a guided tour, take advantage of it; you will always learn something new, even if on a familiar campus!
- g. **Ask** lots of questions – This is your chance to discover things that you will learn no other way!
- h. Trust your instincts and **take notes**. Pay attention to how you feel and especially to your first impressions. Is this where you want to live and study for four years?
- i. Talk to current students! Ask about their experiences.

Take advantage of school websites and other related websites. A good state resource is www.learnmoreindiana.org which has career interest surveys, career surveys, college and university courses of study, admissions planning, and more. QuestBridge National College Match Scholarship

The QuestBridge College Prep Scholars program application opens later this month. This is an opportunity that can get your foot in the door with the Questbridge Program for the college match next year.

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This program offers you the opportunity to attend a college summer program at schools like Yale, Emory, UChicago, and more at no cost to you. Additionally, funds are available to purchase a laptop, receive personalized college essay feedback, and other guidance.

This is an opportunity for students with excellent grades and quality involvement. Your family must make \$65,000 or less as a family of four annually to be eligible.

College entrance exams:

If you're planning on going to college, it's a good idea to take either the ACT, SAT or both. While the tests are *not currently required* for admission into most universities in Indiana, many of them award scholarships based on ACT and/or SAT scores. Taking the test can result in money for college!
