## **Sociology PhD Alumni**

**Better, Alison** (PhD in Sociology 2010, Joint MA in Sociology and Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies 2005) - I am a Professor of Sociology at Kingsborough Community College, CUNY and was elected to the Council of the ASA Section on Sexualities for a term running 2023-26. I am also a Council Member of the ASA Sex and Gender Section (2021-24).

In addition to my teaching at KCC, I am engaged in leading faculty mentoring for my colleagues around tenure, promotion, and publishing, and also serves as a mentor for sociology PhD students around the country focusing on pleasure, sexuality, and embodiment (including UMASS, Michigan, and CUNY, among others).

I am the 2023 recipient of the American Sociological Association Section on Teaching and Learning Hans O. Mauksch Award for Distinguished Contributions to Undergraduate Sociology. At ASA 2024, I will be giving the Mauksch Address on "Pedagogical Dirty Work: Lessons about Respectability from Sexualities Studies."

Fried, Mindy (PhD 1996) - These days, I'm juggling a few different projects:

- I got my start working on aging issues while I was a PhD student in the program, TA'ing for Shula Reinharz. Since that time, I've written a book about caregiving, and launched an award-winning podcast about caregiving called *The Shape of Care*.
- For the past 3 years, I've been working on aging issues for *Our Bodies Ourselves Today*, which is led by another Brandeis PhD, Amy Agigian! I just launched a fundraising campaign for Next Chapters, a new podcast about growing older. The podcast is a project of *Our Bodies Ourselves Today*! - Throughout 2023, my nonprofit organization, Hoopla Productions, trained a group of young people from ZUMIX, a youth nonprofit organization, in interviewing, audio editing, sound design and theatre skills. Using "data" from interviews with 7 immigrant activists that were conducted by

the youth, I wrote a play called Open Your Heart: Immigrant Stories from Boston and Beyond. The youth did an amazing job performing the play, along with 3 professional Latinx actors, last summer at Boston's City Hall Plaza. We now have a short documentary film called Open Your Heart. Check out our website, which includes our trailer, and a form to request access to the film!

- I'm working with Amy Agigian, who is the Executive Director of Our Bodies Ourselves Today! My role is chairing an expert panel on "Growing Older", something we can all relate to, yes? ;-). We are now planning a podcast called Next Chapters. Stay tuned!
- I continue to consult to nonprofit organizations through Arbor Consulting Partners. Currently, I'm evaluating a leadership program for artists run by the Mandel Foundation.
- Thanks to Shula and Karen who introduced me to Sociologists for Women in Society (SWS) back in the 90s, I've stayed involved with the organization. This year, I won the Feminist Mentoring Award, which was a real honor. I'm currently chairing the Media

Relations Committee, which is producing a series of workshops on op-ed writing!

 And finally, my daughter, Sasha, who used to hang out with Judy in the Soc office, got married last September (see our wedding pic!). She and her spouse, D, moved from DC to the Boston area at the beginning of the pandemic, and they now live a 13-minute walk from my house. Such a gift!!



And a Q & A with Rubén G. Rumbaut, author of the 5th edition of Immigrant America (May 2024)

I have announced my *jubilación* from UCI effective July 1, 2024. (The English word "retirement," with its military and religious connotations of retreat and withdrawal, doesn't





hold a candle to its Spanish counterpart.) An "event" to mark and reflect on the occasion will be held next year.

I see this as a "permanent sabbatical," which will free me of full-time teaching and service obligations. I'll assume emeritus status as a research professor, keep my office... and regain vitally needed time. I have a book to finish with a colleague... and miles to go before I sleep.

I arrive at this moment of pending denouement (I call it a "denouemoment!") with a sense of accomplishment and of "awe and owe"... of gratitude to all of you. We sociologists know better than most that it takes two to tango... and many more than "two" to make a career. (Walt Whitman put it better: "For every atom belonging to me as good belongs to you.")

Parece mentira... I taught my first sociology class—an Introductory course with 240 students that I remember vividly—over 50 years ago (I still have the syllabus, which I typed and printed on a "ditto machine" [if you have to ask, google it!].

Fast forward to this week, many thousands of students and countless courses and syllabi later... from UCSD (including a full Spring quarter in Sierra Leone in my first year as a tenure-track assistant professor) to SDSU to MSU to UCI... not to mention research projects of all sorts, collaborations, publications, presentations, and bilingual keynotes all over the world (along with my share of the world's vicissitudes): I just taught my last graduate seminar and my last (and best ever) undergrad class, a new course on war which I'll never forget.

It has been my wont over the years, at the end of a course, to send my students a farewell message, in the form of course-relevant ideas that might stick like Velcro: a classic essay, a poem, a pairing of Marx's 11th thesis on Feuerbach with Walter Benjamin's 9th thesis on the philosophy of history. For this final occasion I've attached a cornucopia of reflections that have been lifelong companions along the way—from Ecclesiates to a Cherokee proverb, from Mandela to Einstein to Twain to Yogi Berra, Shakespeare, Voltaire, Galeano and Machado, even an animated short of The Myth of Sisyphus... some of which may also catch your fancy. Takeaways from a Life of Learning: Last Class Notes.
