Before Reading	During Reading (include all 5 pursuits) The 5 Pursuits:	After Reading
Vocabulary: Asses what they know about Immigrants, Migrants, and Refugees. Talk about the title, author, and picture on the Front Cover of the book. Background Knowledge: "What do you know about immigration? What does it mean to immigrate to a new country or place? Let's see if reading this book can change our minds or help us learn new things.	Identity: How would you feel if you moved to a new place where you didn't know the language or felt out of place? Skills: Discuss with students the order in which the story is occurring while reading the book. Intellect: Why do you think some people leave their home country to come to America? (Discuss America and the benefits of living in a "free country">teach students empathy) Criticality: What are words and actions that may be hurtful to Kanzi or other immigrants? Joy: What ultimately brings Kanzi joy? What does she share with her class that brings her happiness?	After the story, students will practice putting the book into "story order" from what they gathered about the characters' emotions. (Standard:CCSS.ELA-LITER ACY.L.1.1.I Use frequently occurring prepositions) (e.g., during, beyond, toward). The students will be using prepositions such as: in the beginning, during, and toward the end. Discuss the Vocabulary. Immigrants: A person who comes to live permanently in a foreign country Migrants: Another name for an immigrant. Refugees: A person leaving their home country for a safer home somewhere else.
