In an article written by Poornananda entitled 'Coverage of South Asia in two leading US newspapers,' he found that the *Los Angeles Times* and *The Washington Post* gravitated towards sharing merely negative stories on South Asia, such as those on crime, while topics focusing on the sciences and arts were lacking (1). As a Pakistani-American, my heart aches in response. My Pakistani culture is a vital part of my individuality; it is a symbol of my love. By seeing how the media promotes a narrative that neglects the beautiful aspects of my culture, I am frustrated. However, I am also inspired to continue advocating for the richness of my culture, for the weapon to combat misinformation is the strength of one's voice.
