

Lords Act

WHEREAS, the standing General Assembly has shown inconsistency regarding attendance.

WHEREAS, the standing General Assembly has not shown its ability to represent the people of Cycoldia

THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE GRAND REPUBLIC OF CYCOLDIA THAT:

Section 1: Formation of the House of Lords

Article 1: Sitting

- (1) All members of the peerage (excluding Barons/Baronesses) shall sit within the House of Lords, as well as any extraordinary members appointed by Her Imperial Majesty. A member may assume their seat upon reaching the age of 16 years old.
- (2) The House of Lords shall act as a secondary legislature of Cycoldia, with the ability to pass and draft laws, which shall solely require the consent of the Speaker of the General Assembly, the Prime Minister, and the Summi Imperatoria.

Section 2: Seating

Article 2: Appointment

(1) A person may be appointed to The House of Lords by the reigning monarch of Cycoldia by a written notice affixed with HIM's seal and to be kept within the Royal Records and given to the Custodian of the Crown

Article 3: Hereditary Seating

(1) All those who inherit a noble title of appropriate distinguishment through primogeniture and of the peerage shall sit within the House of Lords.

Section 3: Constitutionality

Article 4: Precedent

(1) This act does cite the precedent of the mandate provided by Motion #89 to alter the standing constitution with legislation until it is seen that that mandate is retracted.

Section 4: Legality of this act

Article 5: Code

(1) This act is to be cited as LA, and any sections to be cited using §. For example this subsection is to be cited as LA§4 (5.1).

Section 5: Concluding Provisions

Article 6: Ratification

- (1) This act shall take effect immediately upon the granting of imperial assent by the Monarch of the Grand Republic of Cycoldia, Her Imperial Majesty, Christina I.
- (2) This Act we hereby pass as an Act of the General Assembly on the eleventh day of May in the year two thousand and twenty two of the common era.
