

January 30, 2025, Agriscience Senior Capstone:



As part of their Supervised Agricultural Experience (SAE) program, senior Agriscience students are required to make a "Capstone Achievement Presentation" of their SAE experience. All seniors create a 15-minute presentation explaining their growth and development through the four-year program. It is an excellent opportunity for families to celebrate our seniors as well as to learn more about possible SAE project opportunities. Families are encouraged to attend.

February 13th Greenhand Degree Night



Each first-year high school student in FFA will receive the first five FFA Degrees, the Greenhand Degree. Students will take an introduction to the FFA unit as part of the freshman course work and will prepare for their Greenhand test. All students must

earn an 80 or higher on the test to earn their degree. On February 15th there is a formal FFA ceremony for families and friends to attend to celebrate this achievement. It is often one of the first events where you wear your FFA jacket!




February 13 th Chapter Degree Night

Makes Agriscience Education Different

The Three Circle Program

The Agriscience program is made up of the three-circle program. The three-circle program consists of FFA, SAE, and instruction. The main purpose of this is to learn skills that you can apply later in life. These skills can range anywhere from the history of agriculture to how to fix a tractor. The possibilities are endless, it all depends on what interests you.

Suffield Regional FFA is made up of many amazing people who have a strong passion for agriculture. But our school is just a small part of FFA. FFA is across the world. In FFA you learn the history behind it all. You not only learn who founded the FFA and

what the letters stand for, but you get to learn about how it has evolved over time. Through FFA you get to learn how to be a stronger leader and an all-around better person.

SAE stands for Supervised Agricultural Experience. I know it may sound scary at first, but it really isn't. It is all about taking what interests you and turning into a project that you can watch grow. These projects can range anywhere from researching plants to raising livestock. The best part is you don't have to live on a farm to have a strong SAE. You need to have 150 hours working on these projects. It could be research or hands on. It is all about trial and error and figuring out which path suits you the best. You may think you know exactly what you want to do but, I encourage you to step out of your comfort zone a little bit and try something new. You may find out another thing you are passionate about, or you may decide it wasn't a path for you. But you can at least say you tried.

Classroom instructions are the third circle. The best part about being in ag is that your classroom could be anywhere. One day you could be in the food science lab and the next you may be in the Large Animal Facility. Classroom instructions are not all about sitting in a classroom taking notes. If you are being taught something and you are taking it in, you are learning. Depending on which class you are in, taking notes may be the best way to present the information you're learning but in other classes hands on may be the best way. Classroom instructions can be presented in so many ways.

The three-circle program helps you extend your knowledge. Each part works hand in hand with each other. You may learn something in class that you then apply to your SAE and that is the whole goal. The ag program helps you grow and reach your goals in life.

Agriscience Course Work

Ninth grade students will take a year-long introduction to agriculture education course and are required to complete OSHA 10-hour agriculture training. During the freshman year, they will rotate between four teachers to learn core principles in each of the agriculture pathways. As sophomores, they take Agriculture Biology and begin to select courses based on their interests from the five agriculture pathways available at Suffield. As a Junior and Senior, students specialize in advanced course work to establish their pathway in either plant science, animal science, ag business, natural resources, or power systems. Many students decide to follow a general agriculture education pathway as their agriculture interests include multiple areas. Course work balances classroom instruction with lab experiences. Students develop their knowledge and practice the attached skills that prepare students for careers in agriculture.

General SAE

While you're in the agriscience program you will have to have something called a Supervised Agricultural Experience (SAE). Your SAE project can range from gardening, to carving sculptures out of wood, to taking care of livestock. Basically, anything can be an SAE project if you find a way to work some agriscience creativity into what you want to do! And you can have more than one project if you have multiple areas of interest.



Every year (January 1st - December 31st.) you will have to gain 150 hours of

experience from your SAE project(s). This might sound a little scary gaining 150 hours a year, but don't worry. If you are invested and passionate about your SAE project(s) you will have no problem gaining your 150 hours. And even if you do feel like you're struggling with gaining all your hours, you will have an SAE Advisor (one of the agriscience teachers) who is there to check in and help you with your project.

At the end of every SAE year, you will start to work on a Capstone project. This project involves talking about your SAE project(s) and what you learned, what you need to improve upon, and what your future goals are. At the end of your senior year, there is a capstone night where you will present your complete SAE journey to the chapter, and anyone else who comes to watch!


Community Service:

In addition to your SAE hours, you are required to also gain 10 hours of community service every year as well. Community service is volunteering somewhere to help your community. However, your community service does have to be different from your SAE project. Some examples of community service are volunteering at a church or food bank, meowing/shoveling people's yards, and even picking up trash around your neighborhood.



AET:

Now you may be wondering how you are going to keep track of all your SAE hours. Well, you'll be using something called The Agricultural Experience Tracker (AET). During your freshman year you'll get your login information and will learn how to update your profile, log your agriscience classes, and create journal entries for your SAE hours. AET is helpful and will eventually become your best friend in terms of keeping track of your hours. You can even earn different badges in AET for certain things you've logged!



Career Safe OSHA



All first-year students

participate in the *10-hour OSHA Agriculture Safety Training for Agriculture* course as part of the agriculture curriculum. The Career Safe program is an interactive online program that addresses safety concerns and training that is necessary in today's world. Students will learn about their rights and responsibilities in the school and workplace and gain valuable knowledge about how they can protect themselves and others. This certification will allow us to ensure a common set of knowledge about safety. Once your student completes the Online OSHA 10 —hour Agriculture Industry training course they will receive an OSHA course completion card. This is an industry valuable certification that will be valid for four years.



Student Expectations and the FFA Code of Ethics

The Agriscience program is dedicated to growing young people to be knowledgeable, skilled and responsible agriculture advocates. Students and their families agree by signing the expectation agreement and the FFA Code of Ethics to be held accountable for their actions and decisions. It is hoped that these signed agreements can be utilized as a teaching tool to inspire and strengthen positive attributes of all agriscience students.

Student Retention Policies

It is the goal of the Suffield Regional Agriscience Program for all students to be successful at Suffield High School. The school offers numerous services to assist students in all aspects of school life. In order to maintain a desired level of student performance, routine reviews are conducted for all students enrolled in the Agriscience Program.

Six performance criteria have been established for continued participation in the Agriscience program. They are as follows:

- 1. The student must be present in school in all of his/her classes at least 80% of the time.
- 2. The student must exhibit satisfactory performance in all Agriscience courses.
- 3. The student must be on track for graduation with his/her class by receiving passing grades for all classes.
- 4. The student must exhibit satisfactory self-control in and out of the classroom setting.
- The student must have an acceptable work experience (Supervised Agricultural Experience or SAE) project each year after freshman year.
- 6. Student must adhere to the FFA Code of Ethics.

A student's performance is reviewed at the end of every marking period by members of the Agriscience and Counseling departments and the Principal's office. Students not meeting one or more of the six performance criteria listed above are placed on a probationary status. Students who remain on a probationary status after the end-of-the-year review are subject to dismissal from the Agriscience program. Students dismissed from the program who are not residents of Suffield must return to their home high school. Also, students may be subject to removal from the program at any time during the school year.

Supervised Agricultural Experience

All 10th, 11th and 12th grade students must acquire a minimum of 150 hours of approved SAE work experience each year. Hours are counted from January 1st through December 31st.

FFA

Since the FFA (for the Future of Agriculture) student leadership portion of the program is intra-curricular, all students enrolled in the Agriscience program are expected to become a dues-paid member of the FFA for each year they are enrolled. Attendance, adherence to the code of ethics and participation in a minimum of 5 FFA activities per calendar year is expected.

Appeals


Any student denied admission to a program of Agriscience & Technology or who is about to be dismissed from one, shall be given an opportunity to request an informal review of his/her case before a Review Committee. The committee will be comprised of representation from the sending district, the operating district, Agriscience & Technology staff and the Regional Advisory committee. Any such request must be made within 15 days of the notice of non-acceptance or dismissal. The committee shall meet within 20 days of such request and shall notify in writing, the student and the sending Board of Education, of its decision within 10 days of the review. This decision shall be final and binding on all parties.

Healthy Lifestyles:



Our goal this year is to host Ag Expo, which is our biannual event where our members can show their array of agriculture experience and knowledge. Students can run different rooms and can also prepare presentations to give as well. One other goal this year is to host an FFA Dance at the end of FFA week to celebrate all our chapter's members and the program itself.

FFA Degrees!



Just like all other FFA programs at surrounding schools, Suffield Regional FFA provides you with the opportunity to earn four of the National FFA degrees. Three of which you can earn in high school. Here's a list of the four degrees Suffield Agriscience students can earn and a little bit more about them.

Greenhand: This is the first level of degrees in which it's awarded to freshmen who have learned and demonstrated the basics of FFA. Which includes a variety of things such as the memorization of the FFA Creed and plans for an SAE. Upon completion of this degree, you will receive a certificate and a bronze pin to put on your jacket!

Chapter: This is the second level of degrees that is awarded to sophomores and requires a higher dedication and commitment to the program. Meaning that as part of the requirements for this degree, you must have completed 180 hours of agricultural school instruction and have completed the 150-hour SAE requirements. After being awarded this degree, you will receive another certificate and a silver pin for your jacket!

State: This is the third highest degree overall and is awarded to juniors and seniors. This is the last one you can obtain while in high school. Unlike the Greenhand and Chapter Degrees, this one requires more than some of the basics of the program. For example, some of the requirements of this degree include: 300 hours total in SAE's, 25 hours of community service, 5 FFA activities above the chapter level, etc. Upon completion of this degree, you will receive another certificate and a gold chain with a pin to hang from your jacket.

American: This is the final and highest degree an FFA member can receive. Less than 1% of all FFA members earn this degree. It's also known as the "gold standard" This degree is awarded to graduated FFA members now in college or one year out of high school. After the completion of this degree, you will receive a certificate and a gold FFA degree pin for your jacket. This will be awarded at the annual FFA National Convention.

If your SENDING town has an early release or late opening due to a weather-related reason, you will follow their protocols. AET:	Agriculture Experience Tracker: Digital record book used by all students
Alumni	Parent and graduate support organization, open to all, also called Suffield FFA Family, Friends and Alumni
Ag Ed Agriscience	The program name was changed to Agriculture Education or Agriscience from Vocational agriculture in 1989 to be more reflective of student population and career pathways.
AG STEM Extension	Students can work with AG STEM extension coordinator, Mrs. Zidack. Projects will vary and hours can count as SAE or community service. STEM stands for Science Technology Math and Science.
ASTE	Agriculture Science and Technology Education
Capstone	All agriscience students have SAE for their capstone. Each student develops their project over four years and presents the project in their senior year. SAE Capstone fulfills all school capstone requirements
CDE	Career Development Events, Agriculture content related competitions
Career Safe OSHA	All students complete Career Safe OSHA training during their first year in the program. This 10 hour training program encourages safe practices in school, home and the workplace.
Checks	Checks should be written out to Suffield FFA
Committees	Six major committees that are open to all students to participate in. There are 6 elected chairs that serve on the Leadership Team. Recruitment 2. Healthy Lifestyles 3. Economic development 4. Ag Literacy 5. Ag Advocacy 6. Citizenship
FFA Degrees	FFA degrees are earned to acknowledge growth in the agriscience program. Students earn their Greenhand degree in 9th, Chapter degree in 10th grade. Most students are eligible for their State degree by their Senior year. Some students earn their American FFA degree post high school graduation.
FFA Dues	Dues are paid on an annual basis to cover State and national fees of enrollment.

Official Dress And the FFA Jacket	Worn only at official FFA events. Jackets are available to borrow if a student does not have one. Jackets can be ordered through the National FFA Supply service. Official dress is a black pants/skirt, white collared shirt, FFA tie/ scarf, black socks/stockings with black dress shoes.
SAE	Supervised Agricultural Experience Project. Required by all students to complete 150 hours by December of their Sophomore, Junior and Senior year.
