<p>Course Prerequisite: Students must successfully complete Spanish One in order to move on to Spanish Two. Successful completion of Spanish Two will enable students to continue to higher levels of Spanish.</p> <p>Textbook and Material Requirements: Students will use an online version of the textbook Avancemos. Other online tools such as the Spanish website, Google classroom, and vocabulary review are required as well. It is absolutely essential that students record notes everyday. <p>Course Description: The Level Two student acquires functional vocabulary related to themes such as travel, sports, clothing, legends, and food. He/She learns to comprehend written and spoken language and develops an ability to speak and write sentences in the target language. Cultural awareness is promoted through readings, videos, and projects. Active participation in the target language is important.</p>

Grading Category Descriptions The semester report card grade will consist of the following:											
<u>Summative Assessments/Projects</u> 40%											

Chapter tests require students to demonstrate proficiency in the grammar and vocabulary concepts of that unit. Tests include reading, writing, and listening in Spanish. There is one test per unit and approximately five tests per semester. Therefore, tests have a significant impact on the overall grade.

All students can do test retakes within one week from the point the test is returned. The retake score is the final score.

Final Exam 10%

The final exam at the end of the semester demonstrates the student's retention of information gained over the semester. Study guides are provided both online and on paper. Final exams may not be retaken.

Quizzes/Mastery Work 35%

One to two quizzes are given per chapter to check for student understanding. There may be 5-10 quizzes per semester. All quizzes may be retaken one time by any student. The better score of the two will be final.

The deadline for retakes of quizzes will be one week from the day after the quiz score is returned to students.

Independent Practice Work 15%

Practice work provides an opportunity for students to master concepts. Much work will be completed online using the Live Worksheets platform. Assignments are always due the day after they are assigned unless otherwise stated. Most assignments are graded on a five or ten point scale. Students may make corrections on assignments if those assignments are submitted on time. Students will have approximately 1-3 assignments per week.

Academic Dishonesty

Academic dishonesty will not be tolerated and may result in a grade deduction. See Handbook P. 18-19 for further details.

In the Spanish classroom, this means that the following is not allowed:

- copying another student's academic work product on individualized assignments and assessments
- utilizing technology (such as [Google Translate](#)) to obtain or share answers on assignments and/or assessments, and obtaining unauthorized assessment copies.

Students who are determined to be guilty of academic dishonesty, upon their first offense, will be given the opportunity to rewrite and/or retake the assignment/assessment under staff supervision for up to a 40% reduction (per administrative determination) in the point value of the assignment/assessment.

What Can I Do to Get the Grade I Want?

Certain behaviors and habits tend to result in certain grades. There are always exceptions, but here is a general guideline.

This is NOT A GRADING RUBRIC, but an indicator of what usually results in each grade.

GRADE:	A	B	C	D	F
ASSIGNED WORK	Turn in all work, complete, on time, with few to no errors.	Turn in all work, almost always complete, on time and with few errors.	Turn in most of the work, mostly on time and with some errors.	More than one-third of assignments were late, partially done, and full of errors.	At least half of the assignments were late, partially done, and full of errors.
REINFORCEMENT	Study by doing practice work online, re-reading notes, watching video tutorials for every chapter at least 10-15 minutes per week.	Study by doing practice work online 10-15 minutes per week.	Study by reviewing notes 1-3 times before test.	Study by looking over notes right before the test.	Don't study.


