Introduction. Abstracts of reports can be written in one of the official languages of the conference. The text of the report should have the following sections: introduction, research relevance, problem statement, research results, conclusions.

To ensure the high quality of the conference materials, the authors must follow the abstract design rules given in this template. The organizing committee of the conference recommends that authors prepare theses/articles for printing using this template in Microsoft Word *(theses/articles that are not designed in this template will be sent to the authors for re-design)*.

Research relevance. The organizing committee will consider only materials that correspond to the issues of the conference, designed in accordance with the requirements and submitted within the specified time and in the appropriate format. The authors of the articles bear personal responsibility for the content and absence of grammatical, syntactic and stylistic errors of the provided materials.

Problem statement. In order to comply with the principles of academic integrity, the conference materials will be checked for text borrowings using specialized software tools *(theses/articles in which significant textual borrowings are found will be sent to the authors for re-editing, or rejected)*.

Research results. The volume of report materials should be from 2 to 5 full pages of text in A4 format (including figures, tables, formulas and a list of used sources), designed in accordance with the requirements of this template. The main font of the template is Times New Roman.

Text field: margins: top, bottom, right – 2 cm, left – 2,5 cm. Font - Times New Roman. Line spacing – single.

The title of theses/article should be written as follows: font – 14pt, uppercase, bold; paragraph - without indents, center alignment.

Names of authors (without information about them): font – 12pt, bold; paragraph without indents, center alignment. Information about the authors (full name of the speakers' organizations, country) should be placed under the line with the authors' names: font – 12pt; paragraph without indents, center alignment.

When designing the main text, use a 12pt font with an interval of 1 (paragraph indentation - 1.25 cm, width alignment). The main text should be divided into appropriate sections. Titles of sections should be 12pt, bold.

Tables: format – Microsoft Word or Excel. Above the table on the left, without indentation, there is an inscription of the type: "Table 1 - Name of the table". The interval before and after the table is 6 pt. Example:

If there are images in the thesis text, each image must be signed. Under the figure there is an inscription of the type: "Figure 1 - Name of the figure"; paragraph - without indents, alignment in the center, interval before and after the figure - 6 pt. Example:

Formulas (if available) are placed in the center, numbered and typed in the Microsoft Equation formula editor. To the right of the formula, its serial number is indicated in parentheses. Example:

$$X = |Y - Y_c| \operatorname{tg} (90^\circ - |\beta|) + X_c . \quad (1)$$

When referring to a formula/formulas, table/tables, figure/figures or literary source/sources in the text, use the following designations, respectively: (1), (1, 2); Table 1., Tabl. 1, 2; Fig. 1, Fig. 1, 2; Links to literary sources [1], [1, 2].

Conclusions. Conclusions should be clear and summarize what is presented in the study. This will help focus the reader's attention on the most important points and evidence supporting the relevant arguments or positions. Conclusions can also be the basis for further research, contribute to the generation of new ideas for solving the problem highlighted in theses.

List of sources: numbered list, font - 12 pt.; paragraph - 1.25 cm, alignment by width. The list of used literature is presented as a general list at the end of the manuscript (sequence - in the order of mention in the text) in accordance with the established requirements of the SSTU.
