## GUIDANCE QUESTIONS

## According to Leo Strauss:

- 1. Why is it important to understand that politics is a practical reality made up of concrete human actions, and not just an object of scientific study?
- 2. Why is good the supreme reference that should guide all political action?
- 3. Why should the guide of political action not be power, wealth or glory?
- 4. Why is it important to deideologize political philosophy?
- 5. Why can the ideological labels of liberal, progressive or conservative limit the human capacity to do good?
- 6. Why is it convenient for human action to be led by certain knowledge and not by mere subjective opinions?
- 7. Is it possible to achieve a just political order from relativistic positions or ethical neutrality?
- 8. Can democracy avoid the tyranny of the majority if it is accepted that politics must be ethically neutral?
