



ERPT Induction Handbook

Introduction

Welcome to ERPT! Within this training your trainer will go through the handbook to make sure you understand everything within it. Make sure to ask the trainer if you have any questions and they will more than happily give you an answer. Please make sure you have the Probationary Response Officer handbook open so that you are able to follow along. You do not have the opportunity to fail this training as it is purely informational, so don't be nervous!



As a probationary officer you must complete a mandatory 3.5 hours per week, If hours are Exceeding the minimum it looks better on yourself for promotion within the division.

To get promoted from a probationary officer to a response officer, you must meet the following requirements:

- Have completed your Scene Containment Training
- Have been a member of the ERPT for a minimum of **5 days**
- Have received **0 strikes**
- Have reached a minimum of **15 hours total** clocked on
