At the conclusion of the Musettes Spring Concert held recently, Mrs. Donald Carroll was announced as the winner of the scholarship for 1969.

Each year the Musettes, a women's choral group affiliated with the National Federation of Music Clubs, offers a scholarship for vocal training. Auditions are held and the proceeds from the Spring Concert pay tuition costs for the winner. The scholarship winner studies for a year under a voice teacher of her choosing and presents a solo at the Musettes Spring Concert the following year.

Mrs. Carroll, the former Janell Terwilleger of Boise, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Terwilleger, was born in Milwaukee, Wis. Her family moved to Boise when she was very young and she attended Boise schools, graduating from Boise High School. She was an active participant in music activities in high school.

She married Donald Carroll of Nampa, who is an employee of Union Pacific Railroad. They have two daughters, Dawnell and Pauline. Mrs. Carroll is an

active member of the L.D.S. Church, Fifth Ward, in Nampa. She has studied voice under Charles Ross of Caldwell and Mrs. Winston Goering of Nampa. She plans to use her voice scholarship for further study under Mrs. Goering. Mrs. Carroll is an accomplished seamstress and
