Introduction

Welcome to the fall 2021 semester of Philosophy of Feminism!

Feminism is **the movement to end gendered oppression.** Philosophy is, among other things, **the systematic study of ideas or concepts.** Philosophy of Feminism will therefore involve the systematic study of the following ideas and concepts:

- What is oppression? What are its features? How does it work? How is it perpetuated and enforced? How is it different from other kinds of harm? Who is oppressed? What does it mean to be oppressed according to gender?
- What is gender? Is it a social group? An identity? Is it multiple things? How is gender interdependent on other identities like race and class? What does it mean to be masculine or feminine? What does it mean to be trans or nonbinary?
- What should we do? What is the role of feminist theory in ending oppression? Who is and who ought to be the focus of feminist theory? What critiques exist of feminism? What is the best use of our resources? How do we put our theory into practice (praxis)?

We will approach these questions with the help of historical and contemporary feminist philosophy, as well as some relevant non-philosophy (to be approached philosophically).

Objectives

I aim to help you gain or improve:

- (a) An understanding of the concepts and issues discussed in feminist philosophy
- © Skills in interpretation and evaluation of philosophical arguments
- © The ability to produce a clear and cogent argumentative essay

and most importantly:

© Tools to move through the world with better understanding of its hierarchies, social categories, and injustices, in order to thereby undermine, question, and dismantle them
