Use the graphic to analyze whether or not DJ Earworm's "Turnin' It Up" mash-up falls under fair use.

He relies on certain samples over and over, which define the song's composition, but he's turned them into a completely new song. Even though he's not selling the song, it's made him popular. Plus, he gets paid to DJ.

He just uses a small amount of each song. But he relies on certain samples over and over for the song's composition.

Purpose Amount **Effect**

He uses creative work rather than nonfiction. So that makes it a less likely candidate for fair use.

He's giving the artists increased exposure, which might lead to them making more money. However, he doesn't credit them at the end.

Final decision: Does this mash-up qualify as fair use? Why, or why not?

Answers will vary. As a form of collage, it likely qualifies for fair use. Also, he's been making these mash-ups for many years, and it doesn't appear he's faced any legal challenges. The lack of credit given to the original artists, however, could raise copyright issues.
