

Mrs. Janice Sutton American History Syllabus

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Course Description: This course will explore the overarching themes, trends, and concepts of our nation's history, including the development and evolution of the American system of government, the patterns and impact of migration and immigration, cultural development through the arts and technological innovations, relationships with foreign nations, and the role of both the individual and diverse groups in building the American story. Students in this course will be asked to investigate major turning points in American History to develop an understanding of multiple causation, to determine patterns of change and continuity, and to be able to compare multiple perspectives of the past. Rooted in Inquiry-based skills, students will trace American development while learning to craft compelling questions, synthesize and evaluate evidence, develop claims, communicate ideas, and take informed action. Students will continue to build upon previous studies of American History, the fundamental concepts in civics and government, economics, behavioral science (culture), and geography taught in grades kindergarten through eight as they examine American history. As well-rounded, productive citizens, students will leave the American History course with both the knowledge and the skills to engage with the modern world by recognizing contemporary patterns and connections. - (NC DPI 2021)

<u>Moving to College and Career Readiness</u>: Students who complete this course will be able to go beyond memorization of isolated facts and be able to develop higher level thinking skills. Students will be able to make historical assessments and evaluations.

Late work and Make-up policy: Late work is defined as any assigned work that is not completed and ready to turn in before coming to class on the day it is due. Work not turned in on time will be counted as being "late". Late assignments will be accepted for a grade until one week (5 school days) after the "Perform" date unless the "Perform" grade falls at the end of the quarter for which the principal may set the final date for all work to be submitted. Late penalties of no more than 5 points per day (unless absent) will be deducted for late work (using a 100 point scale). Assignments submitted after the "Perform" date will receive a 50% and feedback on progress will be provided to the student. Work is due the first day upon returning after an EXCUSED absence for no penalty. If a student is absent on an exam day, they must arrange to take the MAKE-UP exam upon return to school but within 5 days of the original date. MAKE-UP exams will not receive the option for extra credit or curve and will be randomized assessment from materials covered within the text and class. NO make-up exams/missing work/retest will be scored after the 5 days of original exam date per CMS 2025/26 scoring policy.



Retake Policy on Unit Assessments:

In the event that a student makes less than an 80% or higher on a Unit Assessment, the student has the opportunity to take a retest on the same material but not the same test. Any student wishing to retake a unit test must do so within the 5 days after the original exam. A student will not be able to score higher than a 79% on the retake.

<u>Infinite Campus Parent Portal Information</u>: Parents may access their student's grades and attendance using the Parent Portal. The teacher keeps grades updated every week. <u>Infinity</u>: Parents can also be observers on their child's Canvas account.

Criteria for a student to qualify for an exemption from participating in final exam in a course that is a non-EOC/state required assessment:

- 1. Students with a grade of an 'A' (90%) or above and no more than 3 absences.
- 2. Students with a grade of a 'B' (80%) or above with no more than 1 absence. Students would have the option to take the final exam to improve their grade rather than the exemption. If a student chooses to take the exam, CMS grading practices are followed, and the exam counts for 20% of the student's final grade.
- 3. For students that have an undue hardship with attendance due to not having transportation established as a new or MCV student or has a documented medical/health condition through an IEP or 504, the principal may exempt the student from participating in a non-EOC/state required final exam if the student has met the academic criteria.
- 4. Students who participate and complete Advanced Placement exams may choose to take the teacher-made final to include in their final grade for the class

ADDITIONAL HELP: Tutoring is available on Thursdays **2:20 to 3:00** and other times by appointment. This is also the time that you can make-up or retake a test, make-up a quiz, or other assignments.

All tests will be shown to the class and discussed at the beginning and end of each unit.
