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Learning Context

Have students learned everything they need to know in order to complete this lesson? This might be a good time to review archival research etiquette and best practices for rare materials. Include background information on Ansel Adams with Smithsonian video.

Procedure

- a. Show Ansel Adams video from Smithsonian
 - Make sure gloves are on and tie into archival user setting comparison to video

Reading Rainbow Tip: Do something to really GRAB their attention! Find a really great book, use a quick video clip, or a sing a song that relates to this lesson plan. Here's where you can spark a child's love for learning.

- b. Direct Instruction
 - Give the students questions to answer or observations to note such as photograph number, what is depicted in the photo, the light to dark contrast/grayscale embodied in the print
- c. Guided Practice
 - Give some background information on the photographic prints and Ansel Adams' connection to the university
- d. Independent Practice
 - Students do the thing
- e. Check for Understanding
 - Ask around the class at the end of 30-35 minutes about observations and add tid bits of university history with it

Reading Rainbow Tip: Ask lots of questions throughout your lesson to make sure that your students are feeling comfortable with all of this exciting new information.
