Lower Division Courses

ANTH 2. Human Origins (4)

Instructor: Branka Hrvoj Mihic

An introduction to human evolution from the perspective of physical anthropology, including evolutionary theory and the evolution of the primates, hominids, and modern humans. Emphasis is placed on evidence from fossil remains and behavioral studies of living primates.

ANTH 21. Race and Racisms (4) - **DEI COURSE**

Instructor: Amrita Kurian

Why does racism still matter? How is racism experienced in the United States and across the globe? With insights from the biology of human variation, archaeology, colonial history, and sociocultural anthropology, we examine how notions of race and ethnicity structure contemporary societies.

ANTH 23. Debating Multiculturalism: Race, Ethnicity, and Class in American Societies (4) - **DEI COURSE**

Instructor: Amy Kennemore

This course focuses on the debate about multiculturalism in American society. It examines the interaction of race, ethnicity, and class, historically and comparatively, and considers the problem of citizenship in relation to the growing polarization of multiple social identities.

Upper Division Courses

ANTH 102. Humans Are Cultural Animals (4)

Instructor: Linnea Wilder

This class examines humans from a comparative perspective; if we ignore culture, what's left? How do culture and biology interact? And how does biology inform cultural debates over race, sex, marriage, war, peace, etc.? **Prerequisites:** upper-division standing.

Sociocultural Anthropology (ANSC) Courses

ANSC 122. Language in Society (4) - **DEI COURSE**

Instructor: Michael Berman

This course examines the role of communicative practices and language differences in organizing social life. Topics include social action through language; child language socialization; language and social identity (ethnicity, gender, class); interethnic communication; language ideologies; and language and power in social institutions and everyday life.

Prerequisites: upper-division standing.

Upper Division Courses

ANTH 101. Foundations of Social Complexity (4)

Instructor: Brady Liss

Course examines archaeological evidence for three key “tipping points” in the human career: (1) the origins of modern human social behaviors, (2) the beginnings of agriculture and village life, and (3) the emergence of cities and states.

Prerequisites: upper-division standing. (*Required for all majors in anthropology.*)

Sociocultural Anthropology (ANSC) Courses

ANSC 144. Immigrant and Refugee Health (4)

Instructor: Paula Saravia

Examines physical and mental health sequelae of internal and transnational movement of individuals and populations due to warfare, political violence, natural disaster, religious persecution, poverty and struggle for economic survival, and social suffering of communities abandoned by migrants and refugees. **Prerequisites:** upper-division standing.

ANSC 166. Film and Culture in Asia (4)

Instructor: Steve Parish

Explores films from China, India, Japan and other Asian countries. Popular, documentary, and ethnographic films are examined for what they reveal about family life, gender, politics, religion, social change and everyday experience in South Asia. **Prerequisites:** upper-division standing.

ANAR 117. Archaeological Field and Lab Methods (8)

Instructor: Paul Goldstein

- Students participate daily in an archaeological research project
- “hands-on” learning
- Optional additional 4 credit course a possibility

The 2018 UCSD archaeological field school will take place on the La Posta Reservation in the mountains of eastern San Diego County, in conjunction with the tribal council of the La Posta Band of Mission Indians (Kumeyaay). Students will participate in digital survey, site registration, mapping and analysis of prehistoric sites on the reservation. Through

hands-on archaeological field experience, and seminars with Kumeyaay elders, students will learn archaeological survey data collection methods, study ceramic, lithic and other artifacts and features, and learn about Kumeyaay history, prehistory, traditions, politics and beliefs. After organizational meetings on campus, fieldwork will take place three days per week on the La Posta Band Reservation, near Campo, one of the least disturbed archaeological zones in San Diego County.

Course Registration: Students will register for UCSD Anthropology course ANAR 117 (8 credits). Students must submit an application that includes a statement of interest, a description of relevant background, a statement of health, and a brief in-person or phone interview. Preference may be given to applicants with prior field research experience or travel, experience in outdoor activities, hiking, camping or sports, computer, artistic or other skills, or relevant coursework in Anthropology, Earth Sciences, Native American or Latin American studies, or other fields.

Field archaeology in the high desert can be strenuous. Students must be prepared and be willing to submit a physician's certificate and waivers upon acceptance.

Course Fees: Students pay regular UCSD Summer Session tuition and fees for the eight credits registered, plus a program fee of approximately \$500 that will cover all instructional costs. Students will travel 3 days a week to the La Posta Band Kumeyaay reservation (approx. 70 minutes each way).

ANSC 105GS. Global Health and Inequality (4)

Instructor: Dredge Kang

Why is there variation of health outcomes across the world? We'll discuss health and illness in context of culture and address concerns in cross-national health variations by comparing healthcare systems in developed, under-developed, & developing countries. Study the role of socioeconomic & political change in determining health outcomes & examine social health determinants in contemporary global health problems: multi-drug resistance to antibiotics, gender violence, human trafficking, etc. Students may receive credit for one of the following: ANSC 105GS, ANSC 105S, ANSC 105, or GLBH 105. ANSC 125GS. Gender, Sexuality, and Society (4)

Instructor: Dredge Kang

How are gender and sexuality shaped by cultural ideologies, social institutions, and social change? We explore their connections to such dimensions of society as kinship and family, the state, religion, and popular culture. We also examine alternative genders/sexualities cross-culturally. Students may not receive credit for ANSC 125GS and ANSC 125. Program or material fee may apply. **Prerequisites:** upper-division standing or consent of instructor. Students must apply for and be accepted to the Global Seminar Program.

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
