The olive Ridley sea turtle is known for its olive green shell. Different conservation groups say it's either a vulnerable or endangered species because their numbers are going down. But you wouldn't know that by looking at the record number of these turtles that recently came to a beach in eastern India. Scientists say the turtles are in the middle of their yearly nesting season, but never before have they seen more than 700,000 olive Ridley turtles in one place. Officials have put up fences around the area where the turtles are to help keep them safe. The female turtles will lay over 100 eggs in the holes they dig. In about a month and a half, at night, those eggs will hatch and the baby turtles will rush to the sea. One wildlife photographer says this is one of the biggest nesting colonies in the world, and that conservationists are lucky to have it in India on the northwestern coast of the Bay of Bengal.

American health officials are working to track and stop a measles outbreak that has infected dozens of people in Texas and New Mexico. When we made this show, the total number of cases was close to 100, mostly in Texas. Authorities think it started in late January. Measles is a very contagious virus. It can spread through coughing, sneezing, and even talking. It mostly affects children, like chickenpox. Common measles symptoms include fever, runny nose, sore throat, and distinct red spots that can appear from the face down to the feet. Most people who get the disease survive. Health officials estimate the survival rate is between 99.7% and 99.9%. However, a large percentage, as high as 25%, of people with measles need to go to the hospital. It's too early to know how this outbreak will compare to others. There are usually anywhere from a few dozen to a few hundred measles cases each year in the US. Before 1963, when a measles vaccine was developed, the country saw several million cases every year. That's why health officials say the vaccine has almost eliminated the virus in America. Even though at least five of the cases in the current Texas outbreak were among people who had been vaccinated, more confirmed cases are expected in the coming days. Officials have opened up new testing centers to keep track of the

outbreak. Besides the vaccine, experts say prevention tips are similar to those for the flu: regularly wash your hands, eat a healthy diet, avoid contact with people who are sick, cover your coughs and sneezes, and stay home if you're sick.

Established by a pilot program in the late 1960s, before any of these other options was available, was a debit card. To debit or credit, that's the question! They're also useful for earning rewards and points, building your credit score, shopping online with fraud protections debit cards may not have, and booking hotels or rental cars which may require security deposits. If you have a credit card, that hold only goes on your line of credit. If you're using a debit card, that means you have to already have that deposit amount in your account. So what's the bottom line? Know your spending habits and what you want out of each card. [Music]

On this date in world history, until 1862, gold and silver coins were the only money in the United States. But after the Civil War broke out in 1861, the Union soon saw a shortage of these coins. So the Legal Tender Act passed on February 25th, 1862, authorized paper money, then called greenbacks. It was a federal and financial change for the country.

On this date in 1951, the first Pan-American Games kicked off in Argentina. The event is basically the Olympics for all the nations in North and South America. More than 2,500 athletes competed in the first Pan-Am Games. Today, they involve more than 6,000 competitors from dozens of countries.

On this date in 1986, a major change came for the Philippines during large-scale protests known as the People Power Revolution or February Revolution. President Ferdinand Marcos, a dictator who had ruled the nation for 20 years, resigned. The nonviolent revolution led to the return of democracy to the Philippines and the election of its first female president.

Where in the world? This is a European country that has no official date of independence. It has overseas territories in the Caribbean, Atlantic, Pacific, and Indian Oceans. Its government type is a parliamentary constitutional monarchy, although that monarchy is mostly ceremonial. This is the United Kingdom, or Britain, a nation of more than 68 million people. The infamous Tower of London, once a prison for enemies of the crown, is now a historic landmark and home to ravens. Ravens have lived at the tower for centuries, and that's by design. It's believed King Charles II was the first to insist that the ravens living in the tower be protected because of a superstition. It foretold that if less than six ravens lived in the tower, it would come crashing down and the kingdom would fall with it. Tower guards called Yeomen Warders have been responsible for keeping the birds happy with living at the tower for centuries. It's a task that's still taken very seriously today. In the 1960s, a Raven Master was appointed to lead the omen. Michael Chandler is the sixth Raven Master ever. When Chandler first joined the Tower Guard, he had no interest in

becoming a Raven Master, but the sleek black birds won him over. "I love the ravens. I love working with them. I love everything about them." Now Chandler happily cares for the ravens, feeding them a mixture of chicken and mouse, cleaning their cages at night. He puts them to bed in cages to keep them safe, but otherwise, the birds fly free. "They're let out at first light in the morning. Uh, they'll do their stuff. They just go. We don't monitor, we monitor them, but we don't control them in any way." The tower is currently home to seven ravens, one more than the legend calls for: Jubilee, Harris, Poppy, Georgie, Edgar, Brandwin, and the most recent arrival, Rex, each with their own unique personalities. "Ravens are similar to us in many senses, um, but more so that they're individuals, their characters, um, just like us. Some don't get on with others. Others are more introverted. Others are more mischievous, uh, and for me, that's part of the draw to the job." Today, few people actually believe that ravens are needed for England to endure, but tradition is a powerful part of culture, especially in a historic place like the Tower of London. So Chandler and his team are doing their best to keep this tradition, odd as it may seem, alive.
