





Dr. Austin-King is a WGSS graduate, with a focus on race and social justice. She also graduated with an interdisciplinary specialization in Latino/a Studies. Dr. Austin-King's research, activism and work focuses on education equity and prioritizes operationalizing intersectional approaches to social change.

Her most recent publication will appear in Films for the Feminist Classroom (2022), with others in Souls: A Critical Journal of Black Politics, Culture, and Society and Frontiers: A Journal of Women's, Studies. Dr.

Austin-King is the recipient of several grants awarded by the National Women's Studies Association, OSU's Department of Women's and Gender Studies, the Office of Diversity & Inclusion, the University of Texas at San Antonio, Columbus College of Art & Design, and the ESC of Central Ohio. She has presented original research both domestically and abroad, including in Spain and various parts of the UK. She has also served as an adjunct faculty member at Columbus College of Art & Design, where she designed the institution's first faculty DEI professional development course.




The Hyatt Regency: Conference Center Map





Participants will be able to explore and critique assessment

passages/text sets and associated items by accepting items as they appear, revising the item, or completely rejecting the item to reflect the same parameters the Ohio Department of Education assessment committees make when making crucial decisions about materials linked to the ELA Ohio's State Tests. The session will be broken up in three parts: analyzing a passage/passage set, critiquing items, and determining performance level descriptors.

Some of the interventions discussed will be reciprocal teaching, math fluency, reading fluency, and writing across the curriculum.

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
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
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
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THE POSITIVE TEACHER PLEDGE
