

Student Responsibilities and Expectations

Academic Expectations

Grading Policy

Grades are cumulative⁹ throughout the semester. Students' grades are based on academic progress and performance, considering a student's entire body of work in each subject area. The grade that is earned on any report card is indicative of what the student would receive in the class if the semester ended right now. All teachers follow the same standardized grading policy, as outlined below.

There are two terms in each academic year and a total of 4 marking periods. Each marking period, students receive an academic grade that reflects their performance on four categories of assignments:

- Mastery of Content (tests, quizzes, role plays, final projects, labs, etc.): 50%
- Literacy reading, writing, speaking, listening (presentations, essays, reports, discussions, participation, etc.): 20%
- Group Collaboration (group work, projects, sharing, etc.): 15%
- Habits of Mind (homework, citizenship, punctuality, etc.): 15%

Homework Policy

Daily homework will be handed-out or posted. <u>All assignments must be submitted on or before the due date</u>. Students must hand in work neatly handwritten in blue or black ink or typed. Pencils are only permitted for bubbling, graphs and diagrams. Failure to submit homework assignments on time will negatively affect a student 's grade and mastery of a topic

Missed Work

Regardless of why a student missed class, the student is responsible for asking teachers about any work they missed. These assignments are due the next time the class meets. If a student is seriously ill or cannot complete their missed work immediately, please contact the guidance counselor for help making a plan so that the student can complete the missed work

Checking Grades Throughout the Marking Period

Students can use their NYC schools log-in information to access their grades. Contact The Parent Coordinator for support.

Grading Scale

Passing Grades: 65 - 100

Failing Grades:

- 55: Student fails to demonstrate mastery¹⁰ of learning standards although they attend school
- NS/45 No Show: This grade is given to a student who fails to attend a course and does not participate in any of the work from which a grade can be derived.

Other Grades:

- NL A grade of 'NL' is awarded to students who enroll in a course after it has started and may have missed assignments or assessments needed to generate a complete course grade for the given marking period.
- **NX Course in Progress**: A grade of '**NX**' is awarded if a student has a <u>documented</u>, <u>extreme</u> <u>extenuating 11 circumstance</u> that prevents him/her from completing the course in its established timeframe (e.g. surgery, death in the family).

'NX' and NL 'do not have a pass/fail or a numeric equivalent. A student who receives a grade of 'NX' or 'NL' must successfully complete remaining course requirements by the end of the semester following the termination of the course in order to receive a final grade and credit, as applicable.

Special Programs & Partnerships

Students must take advantage of all the special programs and partnerships that we have to help improve their academic performance, college, career and civic readiness. These include:

Before and After School Programs - HSSM offers many activities after school. You can participate in PSAL, programs meant to help you improve your literacy and numeracy skills, clubs, and Regents preparation support.



HSSM Student Council - This is a student elected body that works with a faculty advisor, to address the needs and wants of the student body. Led by a president and a vice president, elected representatives from each grade design activities for the school and participate in decision-making around school policy.



College Now Program - College Now is a collaboration between the City University of New York (CUNY) and the New York City Department of Education that prepares public high school students for successful academic performance in college. All HSSM students have the opportunity to take college classes at our school! Students who participate receive both high school credit in this dual enrollment program.


Behavioral Expectations Attendance Policy

Regular and punctual student attendance is important. All students are expected to **arrive at school by 8am** and report directly to class. Absences and latenesses will be documented everyday, and phone calls will be made. If absences or latenesses are excessive (more than one in a given month), additional outreach will be made that may result in a home visit and/or family conference. A student whose attendance is less than 90% is considered chronically¹³ absent.

We expect every student to be in school everyday. Students cannot learn if they are not in school. It is the goal of our school community to remove any barriers that may prohibit our students from coming to school. We ask if students have a job, it is after school hours. We believe that education is the key and will equate to a successful future.

HSSM is a community of individuals (students, staff, families, and community partners) all working together to achieve our mission. We will achieve this through the development and support of healthy, positive, and respectful relationships.

Absence Policy

If you miss school, you must submit an absence note from your parent/guardian, doctor or appropriate agency upon your return. Submit notes to Ms. Lana in the main office, Room 473. Please note that when you submit the note, the day(s) that you missed will still be considered an absence. There will just be a note on your record indicating that it was an excused absence. Students are responsible for completing all assignments when they miss school, even when it is an excused absence.

Truancy

Absence without the knowledge and consent of the parent or guardian is considered truancy. A student who is truant is considered to be cutting all classes missed and will be subject to the disciplinary action outlined for lateness and cutting.

Early Excuse

Students should not have appointments during the school day unless absolutely necessary. If a student has to leave school before the end of your day (even if sick), you must be signed out by an adult who is listed on your blue card. Unfortunately, getting permission by phone is not an option. Please ensure that your parents submit an updated blue card with the contact information of all the individuals who are allowed to sign you out.

School Lateness Policy

School begins at 8:00am. Students must be through scanning by 7:45am. We recommend students arrive by 7:30am to ensure they are not late, as the scanning process can be slow. Students who are repeatedly late will have to develop an action plan with their guidance counselor/advisor. Failure to improve their punctuality will result in counseling sessions, phone calls home to parents, parent meetings with administration, or household visits from the school's attendance officer.

Class Lateness Policy

Passing is 2 minutes. The purpose of passing is to get from one class to another. There should be no loitering in the hallway. If you arrive to class after the late bell, you must have a pass and you must sign the late log. Students who are continuously late to class will receive appropriate disciplinary consequences. Parents will be notified.

Passes and Cutting Policy

- You must get permission from your teacher to leave the classroom
- Sign the bathroom log and get the smart pass to go to the restroom
- Get a nurse's pass to go to the nurse
- Handle other business before or after school or during lunch, except in the case of an emergency. Office passes may be issued by the teacher, only when they determine that a student needs to leave the classroom and go to a location other than the nurse or restroom.

Remember, you have the responsibility of:

- not making a habit of leaving class,
- not staying out of class for too long a period,

• not congregating in the halls or bathrooms.

Your teacher has the right to limit your departure from the classroom if it is habitual. Any student in the hallway without a pass is cutting and will be subject to disciplinary action.

Attendance-related infractions, including tardiness to school, class cuts, truancy, and leaving school without permission, will result in appropriate disciplinary action which include, but not limited by suspension of students.

High School of Sports Management Cell Phone Policy 2025 - 2026

The use of cell phones and earbuds is subject to the policy below.

Cell phones and Earbuds Policy:

Due to a new law of New York State, all personal devices are forbidden in school buildings.

Examples of these personal devices include:

Communication Devices, such as cell phones, smartphones, and smartwatches.

Computing Devices, such as laptops, tablets, and iPads.

Portable music and entertainment systems, such as MP3 players and game consoles.

If parents need to reach their children they can call the main office, (718) 333-7650 ext 4471

If a child needs to reach their parents they can go to the main office and ask to make a call.

*High School of Sports Management is not responsible for lost, stolen, or damaged cell phones and earbuds or other personal property.

Consequences

Students must adhere to this policy at all times. Failure to adhere to this policy will result in disciplinary consequences including: confiscation, parent conference, loss of cell phone privileges, and other consequences in accordance with the Chancellor's Regulations.

Discipline

Students who use cell phones, computing devices, and/or portable music and entertainment system in violation of any provision of the DOE's Discipline Code, the school's policy, Chancellor Regulation A-413, and/or the DOE's Internet Acceptable Use and Safety Policy ("IAUSP") will be subject to discipline in accordance with the guidance interventions and disciplinary responses set forth in the Discipline Code.

Safety and Security Expectations and Procedures

Morning Entry Procedures:

- All students will enter school located at 2630 Benson Ave through the side entrance at the intersection of Bay 43 street and Benson Avenue at 7:30 am.
- All students must swipe their I.D. Card when they enter the building. Students who enter the building without identification may have their entrance delayed and **be asked to wait for clearance**
- Students who do not have their ID cards must sign in and then have their entry manually entered
- Manual entry input takes time and will prevent prepared students from entering the building
- Students may be required to have a new card reprinted before entering the building
- Students may not bring in any glass, or open bottles or containers, permanent markers/paint, vape pens, controlled substances or paraphernalia to school. There is a more complete list of prohibited items, titled "weapons" in the chancellor's <u>discipline code</u>. Please contact the main office at (718) 333-7650 ext. 4473 if you have questions.

Bathroom policy:

Students will use the bathrooms 10 minutes after the start of any class and up to 10 minutes before the end unless there is an emergency. A teacher will sign students out using a smart pass, which gives students 5 minutes to use the bathroom. The bathroom is not a place to congregate.

Student Accident/Illness:

The nurse's room is located in the basement - room B59. If a student has a minor accident or feels ill, the student should be escorted by a staff member to the Medical Office for medical aid. The HSSM staff member should call ahead to the Medical Office (ask Ms. Lana for extension for the nurse, 5592) to alert the Nurse or Health Aide of the arrival of the accident victim / ill student. Please fill out an accident report provided by the secretary or school nurse within 24 hours. If a student suffers a serious accident or medical problem administration may be required to call for an ambulance and/or emergency car.

Dress Code:



The High School of Sports Management is a uniform school. Students are expected to wear their uniform daily. Uniforms have a few parts that are allowed:

- White HSSM Polo shirts or any other plain white Polo shirt
- Black HSSM jogger pants or black khakis or slacks . (No Jeans allowed)
- For girls, no leggings and skirts must be knee-length
- HSSM hoodies are permitted in class at the teacher's discretion
- Button-up white collar shirts & black formal pants are acceptable
- Religious clothes are allowed

Bullying: Chancellor's Regulation A-832 and Sexual Harassment: Chancellor's Regulation A-831

It is vital to protect all students from harassment, sexual harassment, bullying, intimidation, cyberbullying and discrimination.

- •No student shall be subjected to harassment, sexual harassment, intimidation or bullying by another student in school, during school hours, before and after school, while on school property, at school-sponsored events or at a school function; nor shall any student be subjected to discrimination by another student based on a person's actual or perceived race, color, creed, weight, national origin, ethnicity, citizenship/immigration status, religion, disability, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity or expression.
- •"Harassment" and "bullying" shall mean the creation of a hostile environment by conduct or by verbal threats, intimidation or abuse, including cyberbullying.

Any violation of the Chancellor's Regulation will require disciplinary action.

General Response Protocol:

The General Response Protocol gives schools instructions to follow when an emergency happens. It uses common language to identify the steps to take until first responders arrive.

Hard or Soft Lockdown

If there is a soft or hard lockdown students will hear a Public Address (PA) announcement made two times: "Attention: We are now in soft/ hard lockdown. Take proper action." Students must:

• Move out of sight

• Keep silent.

Evacuation

Most times the fire alarm system will alert us to start an evacuation. However, there may also be times when a Public Address announcement starts an evacuation. The announcements will begin with

"Attention" followed by specific directions. They are made two times. During an evacuation, students must

- Leave belongings behind
- Cannot utilize electronic devices
- Form a single file line
 - In cold weather, students should take their coats, if possible.
 - Students wearing exercise or gym clothes will not return to the locker room.
 - Students without winter coats will be taken to a safe, warm location as quickly as possible.

Shelter In

When there is a Shelter-In, a Public Address announcement is made two times: "Attention. This is a shelter-in. Secure the exit doors." The Shelter-In directive stays in effect until it is ended by a Public Address announcement, "The Shelter- In has been lifted." During a shelter in, students must:

- Remain inside the building
- Conduct business as usual
- Respond to specific staff directions

Hold

The Hold response calls for no movement throughout the building until the "all clear" is given. Students

- Disregard "end of class" signals.
- Stay in their room until the announcement is made indicating that the "All Clear" has been issued and the building can return to regular operation.

Consequences for Misbehavior

When a student engages in misconduct, we provide support to address the student's inappropriate behavior and/or underlying needs, together with an appropriate disciplinary response in alignment with the Discipline Code.

Responses include, but are not limited to:

- Student/teacher conference
- Parent phone call or email
- Pedagogical school staff (e.g. Dean, Guidance Counselor, Substance Abuse Prevention and Intervention Specialist (SAPIS) meeting with student to address the misbehavior and its impact
- Restorative practices including collaborative negotiation, circle process, peer mediation, conflict resolution, and formal restorative conferencing.
- Lunch detention
- Exclusion from extracurricular activities
- Formal meeting with student by appropriate supervisor (e.g., assistant principal, principal) to address the misbehavior and understand its impact
- In school parent conference with the dean and/or principal
- Removal from classroom requested by the teacher
- Principal's suspension (up to 5 school days)
- Superintendent's suspension (6 or more school days)

How to...

Change of Home Address: When a student has a change of address, their (parent/guardian) should reach out to Ms Lana, Pupil Personal Secretary so that his/her permanent records can be updated. Ms Lana will make the changes and inform the appropriate staff. Please make sure to have two (2) of the documents below to verify proof of address:

- 1. Lease agreement, deed, mortgage statement for the residence;
- 2. A residential utility bill (gas or electric) in the resident's name issued by a utility company (such as National Grid or Con Edison) must be dated within the past 60 days; A
- 3. bill for cable television services provided to the residence; must include the name of the parent and the address of the residence and be dated within the past 60 days.

Please go to the main office 473 for more information.

Secure Identification Cards (ID) - students have the responsibility to carry your program and ID card with you always, and must pass your school ID card through a scanner to be admitted to school each day. There is a \$2.00 fee for replacing the id card.

Secure Metro Cards -students should see Ms. Lana in the main office (room 473) after school to collect their metrocard. If your metrocard is lost, please report a lost Metrocard. Please note that Metrocards are provided only to eligible students. The Office of Pupil Transportation sets the eligibility requirements. If you live at least 1 to 1/2 miles from school, a free card will be provided. If you live less than 1/2 mile from school, you may be eligible for a reduced fare card - to ask.

Find a Lost Item - If you find a "lost" item, please return it to the Lost and Found in the main office 473. Your assistance is greatly appreciated in returning lost items to their rightful owner.

Guidance and Support Offices

Students can receive a wide variety of support and other resources from the guidance offices. Students can seek help with personal problems, **program changes**, **job searches**, **career assessment** and **working papers**.
